SENATOR ELECT FROM OHIO IN PLACE OF PENDELTON, AND AUTHOR OF THE CIVIL SERVICE BILL.

Henry B. Payne was born November 30, 1810, in Madison county N. Y. and was the son of Judge Elisha Payne, one of the early settlers of that part of the State. He graduated in 1831 at Hamilton Theological Seminary which his father founded, and afterwards read law with Judge Field, formerly of the Virginia Court of Appeals, and John C. Spencer of Canandaigua. He removed to Cleveland in 1833, and finishing his law studies with the late Sheelock Andrews, was admitted to the bar the next year, and practiced law until 1846. Since that time he has been engaged in various extensive business enterprises, and not long ago was a stockholder and director in eighteen corporations, embracing coal, iron, manufacturing and banking interests.

Mr. Payne was a Presidential Elector on the Cass ticket in 1848, and the next year was elected to the Ohio Senate. In 1851 he was the Democratic caucus nominee for U. S. Senator, but was defeated by Benjamin F. Wade by a majority of one.

In 1857 Mr. Payne was the Democratic candidate for Governor of Ohio against Samuel P. Chase, and was defeated by a small majority. He was a warm friend of Stephen A. Douglass and stood by him in the Cincinnati Convention of 1856, and again at Charleston in 1860. During the war he was an active and consistent Union man. At the Baltimore convention of 1872, he favored the nomination of Horace Greeley.

In 1874 he was elected to Congress from the Cleveland District by a majority of 2,500 over Col. R. C. Parsons, of DeGoyer contract fame. Mr. Payne was the first Democrat from that district and entered Congress just in time to take part in the Tilden-Hayes contest. He was Chairman of the House Committee on the Electoral Vote, a strong advocate of the Electoral Commission bill, and a member of the Commission itself. He was also a member of the Committee on Banking and Currency and the author of the bill for the gradual resumption of specie payments, which was adopted by the Democratic caucus, but was never enacted.

Mr. Payne will take his seat in the Senate March 4th, 1885, concurrent with the inauguration of the next President.

Anti-Monopolists.

At an informal meeting of Anti-Monopolists held this day at Salem, Oregon, to consider plans for Organizing an Anti-Monopoly movement in the State of Oregon, Hon. M. Wilkins of Lane county, was chosen Chairman and J. Gaston of Washington county, was made Secretary of the meeting.

After the object of the meeting had been stated by the Hon. T. Davidson, of Marion county, letters were read from Hon. Enoch Hoult of Linn county, Hon. Roscoe Knox of Lane county, Dr. A. C. Kinney of Clatsop county, and others, approving and urging some plan of organization.

Addresses were made to the meeting by the Hon. T. L. Davidson, Judge Boise, Hon. B. F. Bonham, John P. Robertson, Esq., and E. O. Norton, of Benton county, Hon. G. B. Smith, of Benton county, Hon. D. M. Dunbar, and W. H. Meyers of Washington county, as to the propriety and plan of a State organization of the Anti-Monopoly element in politics.

On motion a committee, consisting of Gaston and Dunbar of Washington county, and Boise and Bonham of Marion county, was appointed to draw up a statement of the principles of the Anti-Monopoly movement, and directed to report at the evening session of the conference; after which action, the meeting took a recess for three hours.

RESOLUTIONS.

Upon the reassembling of the conference the committee reported resolutions, which, after long discussion and amendments were adopted unanimously as follows:

1. Resolved, That the law of the last session of the State Legislature known as the Mortgage Tax Law, is just, and assesses mortgaged property in the locality where it properly belongs and that the assessment laws should be so amended as to prevent the making of temporary and fictitious indebtedness to offset assessed values.

2. Resolved, That all grants to railroads in this State, unearned according to contract should be forfeited and restored to the public domain, for the use of actual settlers.

3. Resolved, That Congress and the Legislature of this State should enact laws to protect the people from the unjust discriminations and the oppressive exactions now levied on them by railroad corporations.

4. Resolved, That whenever a person or corporation is doing for, or seriously affecting the general public, such business is subject to regulation by law.

5. Resolved, That it is the duty of the Legislature of this State to pass at its next session a registry law that shall guard the ballot box and prevent illegal voting.

6. Resolved, That the duty of the citizen to the public good is paramount to his duty to any political party, and that no caucus should bind any citizen or legislator to vote against his conscientious judgment; and that the caucus system, as now practiced in controlling State Legislation and the selection of U. S. Senators is productive of fraud and bribery, and often defeats the wishes of the people.

7. Resolved, That it is not proper or safe to elect to Congress or the State Legislature the attorneys or servants of any monopolies.

8. Resolved, That all the tariffs and taxes should be limited to the needs of the government, State and nation, economically administered.

9. Resolved, That we will now support any man for the Legislature, Governor, Supreme Judges or Congress, who is not pledged and known to be reliably in favor of these principles.

ORGANIZATION.

Resolved, That an executive committee of five be appointed, which shall be directed to issue an address to the voters of Oregon, embodying and supporting the above resolutions; and which shall invite correspondence from all friends of this movement throughout the State, and which shall have power to call a State convention of Anti-Monopolists whenever in the judgment of the committee such action is desirable and necessary to the success of the above principles; and which shall advise the Anti-Monopolists of the various counties that they must determine for themselves the propriety of either nominating separate county tickets, or of supporting Anti-Monopolists on the Democratic or Republican tickets; and which shall cause to be issued an edition of 15,000 copies of the Oregon Vidette containing the address of the committee.

Messrs. Davidson, Bonham, Dunbar, Knox and Gaston, were appointed as such executive committee, and Hon. T. L. Davidson, of Salem, made chairman, to whom all letters, papers, and documents for the committee must be addressed.

Resolved, That all papers in the State friendly to this movement be requested to publish the above resolutions.

Resolved, That Wm. H. H. Myers, Esq., of Washington county, be chosen to represent Oregon in the National Anti-Monopoly Committee.
