# THE COMING ENATOR FROM KENTUCKY AND SUCCESS.

Hon. Joseph C. S. Blackburn, who will succeed Senator Willims of Kentucky, March 4, 1885, is in the 46th 1858, but in a few months moved to make a good director. Chicago. In 1860 he returned to Kentucky, and at the breaking out of the war entered the Confederate army as a private. He afterwards joined the staff of Gen. William Preston, as aide-decamp, and distinguished himself for daring and bravery in several engagements.

At the close of the war Mr. Blackbarn settled in Arkansas, but, in 1868, returned to his native State and county, where he engaged in farming, and also the pratice of law. He was elected to the State Legislat in 1871 and 1873; was then elected to the 45th, 46th and 47th Congresses and was reelected to the 48th Congress as a Democrat, received 16,799 votes against 5,-692 votes for Hord, Republican.






