

## Democratic County Convention.

A Democratic County Convention for the purpose of nominating a full County ticket, to be voted for at the coming June election, and selecting seven delegates to the State Convention, is hereby called to meet at Eugene City, Friday April 11, 1884, at 10 o'clock, a. m. The following is the representation allowed each precinct, based upon one delegate from each precinct and one delegate for each 25 votes or majority fraction thereof cast for State Senator at the last June election:

## The County Convention.

Before our next issue, the Democracy of Lane county will have placed their standard bearers, so far as the county is concerned, in the field. It is to be hoped that the convention will act wisely, and put forward men for the different positions whose reputations for honesty and qualifications for the positions to which they may be called by the people are unquestioned. The Legislative portion of the ticket, especially, should be filled by men with broad views and with some business experience. Besides the election of a United States Senator, which is political, they will be called upon to pass on measures which will materially affect our future prosperity both in county and State, one of the most notable being to pass a law requiring foreign corporations to pay their just share of the public taxes. It is not only essential to have men who if elected, will vote right on these questions which so materially affect our interests, but their capabilities for personally promoting and influencing legislation should be considered.

In the selection of men for county officers, their qualifications should be specially considered. The affairs of the county should be honestly and economically administered. The sectional issue which is so often used to influence delegates by designing and intriguing men should have no weight with the convention. Often time a weak man, who is certain to be defeated, will be nominated because he happens to live in a certain locality; while a candidate who could be elected is passed by and discarded for the same reason.

The absence of strife and bickering between the candidates is a favorable omen. No personal feeling is observable, and we believe that when the candidates are nominated the defeated aspirants will stand up firm and true to the nomination. The county is nearly equally divided and to insure success, harmony must prevail.

Democrats, if you wish to see a good ticket nominated, attend the primary meetings to-day and select competent delegates.

## Lane County Pioneers.

At an adjourned meeting of the Directors appointed by the Pioneer Association of Lane County, held at the bank of Hendricks & Eakin, April 1st, the following programme was adopted for their grand reunion to be held June 5, 1884:

On motion of Dr. E. R. Geary, the grove adjacent to the city of Eugene on the east was selected for holding the first grand reunion of the Pioneer Association of Lane County; and the first Thursday in June, 1884, as the time of meeting.

On motion of E. P. Coleman, the Association will form in front of the Court House, on Eighth street, and march under the direction of the Grand Marshal, who shall be Captain of the Day, and who shall be assisted by such aids as may be selected.

On motion of A. S. Patterson, the procession shall be formed at 10 o'clock, a. m. The following order of business was adopted. After marching under the direction of the Captain and aids:

1. Camp will be formed near the stand erected for the speaker.
2. Music.
3. Prayer by the Chaplain.
4. Music.
5. Oration.
6. Music.

After which the Pioneers and their friends will repair to their camps or wagons and partake of dinner. After dinner a meeting around the camp fire will be in order, at which time there will be toasts, short speeches, reminiscences of the eventful past, etc. Immediately thereafter the Pioneers will repair to the Court House for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year, and to transact such other business as may come before the meeting.

On motion of Dr. Geary, Elder Philip Mulkey was selected Chaplain of the Day.

On motion of A. S. Patterson, E. P. Coleman was selected Chief Marshal of the Day.

On motion of E. P. Coleman, Judge J. J. Walton was selected Orator of the Day.

On motion of Dr. Geary, Samuel Ogden was selected as Assistant Marshal.

On motion of Dr. Geary, Judge E. S. Bean was selected as Alternate Orator.

On motion the Secretary was requested to notify the officers of the day of their election, and also to give a copy of these proceedings to

each of the city papers with a request that they publish the same.

A Committee of three on Grounds were appointed, consisting of S. A. Ogden, T. G. Hendricks and Wesley Shannon.

A Committee of five on Music were appointed, consisting of J. H. McClung, Geo. Gill, Mrs. L. G. Adair, Miss Nettie McCormack and Miss Irene Dunn.

A Committee of three were appointed on Toasts, consisting of President Johnson, Hon. A. S. Patterson and Hon. T. G. Hendricks.

On motion the directors adjourned sine die.
