

Democratic State Convention.

The State Democratic Convention is hereby called to meet at Dalles City, on Thursday the 17th of April next, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following offices: Judge of the Supreme Court, three Presidential Electors, Representative in the Lower House of Congress, and District Officers for the several judicial districts, and to select six delegates to the National Democratic Convention, and generally do such other business as may of right come before the Convention.
