MORE FAMILIARLY KNOWN AS "CHINESE GORDON."

Over in the Soudan, in Khartoum, on the White Nile, this famous general is now threatened with annihilation. As the special agent of the British Government General Gordon was dispatched up the Nile on a mission of conciliation and reassurance to the Soudanese, and for a short time after his arrival in Khartoum and the issuance of two remarkable proclamations declaring that the rights of the natives would be protected and the slave trade again allowed, it seemed to the world that General Gordon, with a handful of men armed with the diplomacy of peace offerings would prove a conquering hero against the army and cause of the false prophet, El Mahdi. But a reaction occurred and to-day the situation is of the most alarming character for the personal safety of General Gordon. Even while this article is in type the news may be flashed across the continent that Khartoum has fallen and with it brave "Chinese Gordon."

General Gordon was the youngest son of the late Gen. H. W. Gordon, R. A. After receiving a military education at Woolwich Academy, he served in the Crimean war with great credit. In 1860 he visited China and by a bold and dashing, yet judicious support of the Chinese Emperor in the Taiping Campaign, he earned great honor and credit from both the British and Chinese government, and henceforth was known as "Chinese Gordon." His fame now grew world-wide. The late Khedive of Egypt, Ismail Pasha, called General Gordon to his aid in abolishing the infamous slave trade and strengthening his decreasing power. After a labor of five years on the White Nile, in Darfour and Cardovan, he had partly accomplished his mission and returned to London, as the present Khedive, Tewfik Pasha, was not favorably disposed to him. The present Egyptian complications induced Gladstone to again send General Gordon into that country as a conciliator. His loss would be a calamity to his government. He is at present fifty-four years of age.

It is said that Mary Anderson is worth \$350,000. She has assumed the full control of her affairs at last. They used to be absolutely in the hands of Dr. Griffin, who "allowed" her a little money now and then; she now dictates to him supremely. He receives a liberal salary from her for managing the business of the concern and has to account every week as rigidly as though she did not know him from an old boot.

### The Japanese Duel.

The mode among the Japanese may be illustrated by the following example: Two officers belonging to the Emperor's staff met upon the imperial staircase; their swords happened to entangle and words arose. Said one to the other, coolly, "It is only an accident, and at best it is only a quarrel between two swords." "We shall see about that," cried the other, excitedly; and at these words he drew his weapon and plunged it into his breast. The other, impatient to obtain the same advantage, hurried away upon some errand of service which he was slowly performing and instantly returned to his antagonist, who was already at the point of death. On inquiring if he was still alive, and being informed of the fact, he also plunged his sword into his own body, exclaiming, "You should not have had the start of me if you had not found me engaged in the service of the Prince. I die content, however, since I have had the glory of convincing you that my sword is as good as yours."—Alta California.

### American Wines Sold as European.

In the city of New York alone they drink between 10,000,000 and 15,000,000 gallons of extra California and other native wines, under the belief that they are imported from France, being duly accredited with a French label. The proportion of European wines imported as against American wines produced is about 5,000,000 gallons European, as against 35,000,000 the products of our own vineyards. Yet, says a great authority on the subject, although we grow eight times as much wine as we import, and can reckon the wine consumed at 40,000,000 gallons in the rough, we sell 20,000,000 gallons of quasi European wines every year to consumer. Of course, this means a blending of twenty-five per cent of foreign wines with seventy-five per cent of American wines, or even more, allowing for a small percentage of sales of genuine French hocks and clarets.

De Lesseps's canal is forging ahead; Lieutenant Roger's second year's report is out. There are 15,000 men at work and a million cubic metres a month will be excavated this year to 700,000 last year. And before the next rainy season it is hoped the annual excavation will reach 25,000,000 of cubic metres. De Lesseps has set 1888 for the opening of the canal, but Rogers puts it 1892. Forty millions of dollars have been spent, a full third of De Lesseps's estimate for the total cost of the work. But whatever amount may be necessary to complete, it can easily be obtained. If no great drawback is experienced, the canal will be in full operation in 1892, in time to celebrate the four hundredth anniversary of the landing of Christoval Colon, commonly called Columbus.

Recent improvements by the inventor make the Gatling gun capable of discharging to a distance of three miles twelve hundred bullets a minute. When first invented these machines threw out bullets at the rate of 150 per minute. Such accuracy of aim has been obtained that "the gun can be aimed at a plank nailed to a support several thousand yards away, and by moving the gun rapidly along while firing we can cut a line through the board as though it were sawed. Bullets of different sizes are used in different guns. No two bullets leave the gun at the same time, but when it is considered that 1,200 shots can be fired in a minute it will be seen how rapidly and regularly it works.

Those who have the best means of knowing, estimate that legitimate emigration will increase the population of Washington Territory 30,000 during the present year.
