The Journal of last week, ignoring the remainder of the Republican county ticket, effervesces as follows. "Every citizen is deeply interested in the election of the Republican candidates for county judge, commissioners, and sheriff as these officers exercise a controlling influence in county affairs." This is rather a sweeping declaration considering the fact that at the last election the Democrats elected eleven of the fourteen county officials and all of those above named and that a recent Democratic county convention has placed in nomination candidates for the offices of county judge, commissioners and sheriff. It would appear from the special interest the Journal takes in those officials, that it would willingly sacrifice the remainder of their ticket to secure their election.

We are not so exclusive in our advice to the intelligent voter. There are candidates for the legislature, which are all important, as there is a United States Senator to be elected by the coming legislature, clerk, treasurer, school superintendent, assessor, surveyor and coroner, in addition to those to whom the Journal gives especial attention, and as all the candidates for the above offices are fit and capable men to fill the offices for which they were nominated we would advise the Democratic element of the voters to stand by that ticket. In fact for several election past Republicans have been elected by Democratic votes in this county. It is time to call a halt in this business.

The Democratic nominees for Commissioners, Messrs N H Hill and J G Mitchell, are both excellent selections, and will administer the affairs of the County economically and honestly, if elected. Both are farmers, Mr. Hill residing in Richardson precinct and Mr. Mitchell in Pleasant Hill precinct.

Hon. Binger Herman deeming "discretion the better part of valor," will not meet Hon. John Myers on the stump to discuss the political issues of the day. It is better this way, of course, as Mr. Myers might ask a few embarrassing questions and that would spoil all his bloody-shirt eloquence.

The same reason that recommended the Republican aspirant in preceding years is now in favor of Mr. R. H. James. He is honest, industrious, intelligent and deserving. He has been peculiarly unfortunate in having had sickness in his family; he needs the office and his opponent doesn't.

The Democrats and Republicans in Lane county should attend the speakings of Hon. John Myers, Democratic candidate for Congress. If elected, he will work for the people, and not for Portland solely, as the present Republican Senator and Congressman are doing.

The enacting clause of the Morrison bill was stricken out this week by the solid Republican vote with the aid of a few Democrats. Of course, M. C. Geale voted against the people, as usual.

Hon J J Walton, our candidate for County Judge, is known personally by nearly every voter in Lane County. He will receive many Republican votes.

Judge D. Flynn, of Linn county, for supreme judge, is a very poor selection, and as this is not a political office, his opponent, ex-Governor Thayer will very likely be elected. The supreme court of the State is in great need of the best legal ability we have, so as to give our reports a standing with those of other states, Hon W. Lair Hill, one of our ablest lawyers, would have been an honor to the State, and has ability as a jurist would have made our reports high authority. —The Dalles Mountaineer, (Rep).

Every Democrat in Lane county should, on the 2d day of June, cast his ballot for Mr. C. K. Hale for County Clerk. He is fully competent, and will attend to the duties of the office fully as well as the Republican candidate; besides, in a Republican form of government it is not well that any officer should hold for lifetime.

Vote for F. W. Osburn for Coroner. He has made an excellent officer, and will set on the already moribund Republican ticket next June.
