Commissioner's Court.

The regular May term of County Court met at the Court House, in Eugene City, Wednesday, April 7, 1884. Present—Judge Church, Commissioners Veitch and Stevens, Sheriff Campbell, Clerks Ware. At this time it is ordered that the road supervisor of district No 34, remove all timbers and obstructions from the county road leading from the Mills Fork to the residence of A D Hulan, in said district. In the matter of the Lost Creek bridge ordered that contract for building said bridge be let to A W Horn, for \$700; the county to pay \$400 of said amount. In the matter of the application of J A McMahon for change of road; ordered established. Damages awarded as follows: Jas Spier, \$12.4 A L Vaughn, \$7; M A Rimmer, \$5. At this time the Court appointed the following supervisors: District No 35, Jesse Hawley, No 32, Theo Goff. At this time a new road district was established at the mouth of Lake Creek, with John L Pyles supervisor. In the matter of the application of B S Hayden and others for county road; ordered that Henry Moore, Jesse Soren and G G Pender be appointed viewers, and James Nolan surveyor, to meet May 22, 1884. In the matter of the application of Wm Williams for county road; ordered that A J Guldard, I Martin and P A Wagner be appointed viewers, and James Nolan Surveyor, to meet June 5, 1884. In the matter of the application of A B Bittel, and others for county road; ordered that D L Mussell, L F Canage and I Conlon be appointed viewers, and Jas Nolan surveyor, to meet May 29, 1884. In the matter of the application of I W Gay and others for county road; ordered that the road be declared a public highway. In the matter of the application of John French and others for county road; ordered declared a public highway. At this time it is ordered by the Court that S S Stevens be appointed to examine the territorial road from the Dickworth bridge across the Long Tom bottom, and report at the next term of the Court the condition of said road with recommendations of plan to repair same. At this time the contract for building the bridge across the Coast Fork at the residence of E P Redford was let to L N Roney for the sum of \$1,500, this being the low bid. At this time the Court appointed W S Hall supervisor of district No 43, for the year 1884.

This is a rehearing of the famous Hayden and Dove case that was tried in Deady's court and was appealed to the Supreme court of the United States, and there reversed on the ground of want of jurisdiction. The case now comes for hearing in the State court on its merits. Judge Hayes having acted as counsel in the case when it was in Deady's court, the case is being tried by Judge Bean.—Salem Statesman, May 7th.
