Hon. John Myers at Portland.

We take the following extract from the Oregonian's report of Hon. John Myers' speech in that city. Over one thousand persons were present:

\*\*\* He pointed out several inconsistencies in the Republican platform. The Republicans say the state should control the railroads, but refused to allow Mr. Durham's resolution to be introduced. They say they want a registry law, but nominated men who have voted against one. At the last session the registry law was defeated by the Republicans, all but five voting against it. One Republican candidate for the legislature from this city had voted against his bill for a road law which would greatly benefit this country.

In conclusion he made a strong plea to the people to vote for their own interests and be no longer subservient to rings, which courted them on election day and then turned against them. His speech was a plea for support on the ground that he would try to secure legislation to relieve the people from the power of selfish corporations—to stand up for the party that is their friend. It was evidently well received. Although Mr. Myers is not an orator he speaks very well as laboring man, and with an air of candor and conviction which add weight to words which eloquence alone cannot impart. As he concluded Governor Thayer was called to the stand and made a short address. The meeting closed with cheers for the candidates and for the party.

### The Nominees.

The Republican State Convention has done its work. Among the many aspirants for office the majority were retired to the shades of private life. The successful ones are before the people claiming their suffrage. For Congress Hon. Binger Herman of Roseburg was the fortunate man, although the contest was a spirited one between himself and Judge Caples of this City. Mr. Herman who possesses only a local reputation will have a uphill work in the canvass against his opponent whose long service in legislative work has brought him favorably before the people. The nomination of Judge L. Plinn of Linn county was specially inopportune; especially when such an able man and lawyer as W. Lair Hill was "shelved" for that purpose. The Presidential electors are Judge Warren Truitt, of Polk county; J. C. Leasure, of Umatilla county, and D. P. Thompson of Multnomah county. The Republicans have certainly not put before the people their strongest men, for reasons which will lose them many a vote ere the close of the campaign. The difference between the two parties in Oregon is not so great as people are led to believe; as the difference is only in the changing of a few hundred voters on the day of election. The real vote uninfluenced by "outside pressure" is so nearly even that no party can afford to trifle with the better sentiment of the great mass of voters.—Portland Hesperian, (Ind. Rep.)

The organ of Tammany Hall, the New York Star—which, by the way, is one of the brightest papers of the national metropolis—has come out flat-footed for the "old ticket," Tilden & Hendricks. John Kelly says that S. J. Tilden and Gov. Parker of New Jersey, are the only Democrats who can carry New York, the great pivotal state, in the coming Presidential election.

All of those Republicans who are opposed to the election of lawyers to office seem highly pleased with the nomination of Flynn for Supreme Judge.

### LOST IN THE ARCTIC REGIONS.

LIEUTENANT ADOLPHUS W. GREELY.

At last, the first vessel of the Greely Relief Expedition, the "Bear," has sailed for the Arctic regions on its humane mission of rescue. Two other vessels, the Thetis and Alert, will soon follow, and if Lieutenant Greely and his party are still survivors, they may yet be rescued and returned to their country and friends.

It will be remembered that the Greely expedition set out in mid-Summer nearly three years ago, to man one of the Polar stations in the North, established for scientific purposes, by the leading governments of the world. The party left the ship "Proteus" at Lully Franklin Bay and proceeded northward. Nothing was heard of Greely and his followers for some time, and then reports were received at the War and Navy Departments, that the party were in distress. An expedition was immediately sent for their relief, which was compelled to return without accomplishing its purpose, or even being able to obtain any reliable information in regard to the fate or whereabouts of the missing party.

The details of the organization and equipment of the present expedition by Congressional action are fully known to our readers. We publish an excellent likeness of Lieutenant Greely, who was born in Massachusetts, and is about forty years of age. He is not a graduate of any of the military academies, and he entered the war as a private. His military record is highly honorable. From private he was promoted to corporal and first sergeant in Company B, of the Nineteenth Massachusetts Infantry. On the 18th of March, 1863, he was made Second Lieutenant in the Eighty-first U. S. Colored Infantry, and in April, 1864, he was promoted to First Lieutenant. He was brevetted Major on the 13th of March, 1865, for "faithful and meritorious services." He was made Captain of the Eighty-first Colored Infantry on the 14th of April, 1865, and on the 22d of March, 1867, he was honorably mustered out.

Upon the reorganization in 1869, he was assigned to the Fifth Cavalry, and became First Lieutenant in 1873, which is his present rank.

The Republican State ticket seems to be rather a tame affair. Judge Caples, W. Lair Hill, and men of ability and standing in the party were sacrificed by the ring in the interest of the Portland Senatorial goose, which, if the people consult their own interests and act wisely, will be pretty well cooked on the 21 of June. Binger Herman is only a moderate lawyer, with no marked qualification for the position, is a chronic office seeker and has generally kicked out of the traces when his aspirations were not gratified. He is, since his nomination, well pleased with the record of his party and can be relied on to oppose the payment of the rebel war debt. The nomination of Flynn is so decidedly weak that several leading Republican papers including the Oregonian and Astoria Independent advocate the election of Thayer. There is now but little doubt of the election of Thayer, and the election of Hon. John Myers is quite probable.—Courier.

The Roseburg Independent, whose editor is the law partner of Binger Herman says: Herman will do well if he gets three-fourths of the Republican vote of the state, and has no thought that he will be elected.

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
