A Grumbler and Kicker.

EDITOR GUARD.—Permit me space in your valuable paper to state that the correspondent writing from this place to the Journal, under the nom de plume of "Nika," is a chronic and irrepressible grumbler and kicker, a man without personal friends or influence in this locality or elsewhere. Ostensibly a Democrat he seldom appears at the polls, and when he does, only for the purpose of exercising his mulish propensities for kicking. At one time he gained the confidence of the Democratic party to such an extent that they elected him State Senator. How did he use that position? by betraying the trust reposed in him by breaking up the Legislature, by resigning and leaving it without a quorum thus defeating the passage of the appropriation bill, whereby \$200,000 was left in the State treasury for two years while State warrants went at a discount drawing interest at the same time, costing the State nearly \$40,000 paid in interest. You may rest assured that statements coming from that source will have no influence or weight where the author is known. Mr. Hayes, rest assured, will lose no votes in his own neighborhood as he is known as an upright and honorable man.

Justice. The Oregonian intimates that protection is not right, but is an expedient of the Republican party to secure votes, which is all very well. That paper further says that having supported the manufacturing brigands they are in favor of what they voted against, and as soon as they shall deem it "expedient" the robbery and their support of it shall cease. How has the morality party fallen! We learn further, on newspaper authority, that one-fourth of the Republican members, about 31, are in favor of low tariff, against 152 Democrats who favor it. The low tariff "Republican" members are too few and too expedient to accomplish any reform. The Oregonian will next be defending burglars but not burglary, of course, as the burglar would willingly abstain from his arduous vocation, like the pseudo Republican tariff reformers, were it not for a question of expediency and advantage.

A Journal correspondent, writing from Long Tom, actuated, no doubt, by spite and envy, seeks to injure the Hon. R. B. Hayes through the columns of that paper by a concoction of misrepresentations, innuendoes and puerile statements unworthy of the attention of any person of intelligence and sense. Mr. Hayes has represented Lane county in the Legislature for three terms and made a record for honesty of which he may well be proud, while personally his character is above reproach. He will not suffer from the malicious scribbles of some disappointed fault-finder.

There is no sound or moral so widely distributed as salt. The infancy of the Indian Government in placing a tax on salt, which is almost as universal in the earth as oxygen in the atmosphere, has been expiated upon by a thousand writers; that rate was about fifteen per cent.
