Opposition to Blaine.

NEW YORK, June 8th.—It is re-
ported the Boston Advertiser announces
that it will not support Blaine.

The Times of this city says: "One
word as to the position of the Times,
it will not support Blaine for President,
It will advise no man to vote for him,
and its reasons for this course are per-
fectly well understood by everybody
that has ever read it.

The Truth, which recently had let-
ters from President Arthur, Hamilton
Fish and others, commenting on its in-
dependence, shows its true colors this
morning by the following head lines,
with comments to suit: "Mulligan,
Jumping Jim and Black Jack nomi-
nated, alias the Republican party."

Blaine's nomination is not only a
surprise to the Herald, but bitter dis-
appointment. It heads its article:
"Worse than a crime;" and says: "We
are sorry for it and we believe the Re-
publicans will all be sorry next No-
vember, but although every man who
cares for the purity of public life and
the welfare of the country, and espe-
cially all those who hoped for the re-
demption of the Republican party from
the evil elements that have already
dragged it down in the depths, most
poignantly regret a nomination like
this. There has grown within a day
or two in many circles a sentiment that
will regard the nomination with grim
sense of satisfaction."

Coeur d'Alene Mines.

A few days since a practical miner wrote
from the Coeur d'Alene mines to a friend at
Salt Lake in the following comprehensive
style: "Times are awful dull here at pre-
sent, and very little work is going on. Money
is very scarce indeed. The people there who
own mines don't seem to go ahead and open
their claims up, and they don't know what
they have got yet. They all think they have
got the world by the tail and all want to
sell out for a big thing. They are a lot of
old Webfoot ranchers located here, who
have taken up the country for miles and
are doing nothing on their locations, but
are sitting around the saloons waiting for
some one to set up the drinks for them and
they can mine like good fellows while drink-
ing forty-rod whisky. I believe I have been
all over the mining camp here, as they call
it, and I haven't seen anything in the shape
of mines. I have seen some pretty gold,
but only a little of it. The gold is coarse
and ragged, and at present there are about
three placer mines working and they only
work a few men on each claim. Wages are
low for a new mining camp, only paying
miners, as they call them, \$2 50 and \$3 50
per day and board, and they can get all the
men they want at these prices, as lots of
men are here looking for work and are sell-
ing their blankets and leaving daily for the
railroad. How is this for high! single meals
\$1; lodging, \$1 per night. Gamblers and
fancy girls are batching, showing that money
is scarce. These classes are leaving the
camp. Not much building is going on.
