Heavy Failure.

Last Wednesday morning Sheriff Camprell closed up the store of Lurch Bros at Cottage Grove, on several attachments. Up to the present time the following attachments have been served;

G R Chrismau.....\$3,284 Phoebe Kinsey ..... Wm Carrin..... 2,383 

Making a total of about \$16,732. Besides these several amounts, the firm owes between \$10,000 and \$15,000 not included in the above, in Lane county. It is also ascertained that the firm owes about \$30,000 in Portland and San Francisco, making a grand total of about \$60,000. A few years ago the same firm failed for a large amount and settled for 18 cents on the dollar. We understand that the assets of the firm will amount to about \$10,000.

There is hardly a man in the neighborhood of Cottage Grove that the firm does not owe. On many the loss will fall heavily. The school district, of which Aaron Lurch was Clerk, is also a sufferer, and the district, unfortunately, required no bonds.

The way the firm "cinched" so many, was to give notes supposed to be signed by different parties who stood first class, but now upon inquiry it is found that the parties deny ever having signed the paper. In the case of some of the loans collateral was given and it is now earned that a great many of them are also

AARON LURCH ARRESTED. # Ordinance No. 11.

Be it ordained by the City Council of

Eugene: SECTION I. The base of grade or bench-mark for Willamette street shall be the top, of the curb stone even with the first floor of

the old stone building on the northeast cor-ner of Willamette and Eight streets. SEC. 2. The center line of the intersec-tion of Willamette and Eleventh streets shall be two feet below the base or bench mark; the intersection of Willamette and Tenth atreets shall be 1 30-100 feet below the base of grade; the intersection of Willamette and Ninth streets shall be 60-100 feet below the base of grade; the intersection of Wil-lamette and Eight streets shall be 53-100 feet below the base of grade, and a point 100 feet south of this intersection shall be 40-100 feet below base of grade and this point shall be the highest grade between Sixth and Eleventh streets.
