Gov. Cleveland Formally Accepts.

Gov. Cleveland was tendered the Democratic nomination last Wednesday by the National Committee, and accepted the nomination in the following brief and well chosen remarks:

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of the Committee:—Your formal announcement does not, of course, convey to me the first intimation of the result of the convention held by the Democracy of the nation, and as I listen to your message I see about me representatives from all parts of the land of the great party which, claiming to be the party of the people, asks them to entrust to it the administration of the Government. And when I consider that under the influence of the stern reality which the present surroundings create that I have been chosen to represent the plans, purposes and policy of the Democratic party, I am profoundly impressed by the solemnity of the occasion and by the responsibility of my position. Though I gracefully appreciate it, I do not at this moment congratulate myself upon the distinguished honor which has been conferred upon me, because my mind is full of an anxious desire to perform well the part which has been assigned to me, nor do I at this moment forget that the rights of 50,000,000 of my fellow citizens are involved in our efforts to gain Democratic supremacy. This notification presents to my mind the consideration which more than all other, gives to the act of my party in convention assembled a most serious and sober aspect. The party and its representatives which ask to be entrusted, at the hands of the people, with the keeping of all that concerns these people and their safety, should only ask it with the full appreciation of the sacredness of the trust, and with a firm resolve to administer it faithfully and well.

I am a Democrat, because I believe the truth lies at the foundation of Democracy. I have kept the faith because I believe, if rightly administered and applied, Democratic doctrines and measures will insure the happiness, contentment and prosperity of the people. If in the contest upon which we now enter we steadfastly hold to the underlying principles of our party's creed, and at all times keep in view the people's good, we shall be strong because we are true to ourselves, and because the plain and independent voters of the land will seek, by their suffrages, to compass their relief from party tyranny, where there should be submission to the popular will, and their protection from party corruption, where there should be devotion to the people's interest. These thoughts lend a consecration to our cause, and we go forth not merely to gain a partisan advantage, but pledged to give to those who trust us the utmost benefits and honest administration of national affairs. No higher purpose or motive can stimulate us to supreme effort, or urge us to continuous and earnest labor and effective party organization. Let us not fail in this, and we may confidently hope to reap the full reward of patriots' services well performed.

I have thus called to mind some simple truths and a trite thought. They are, it seems to me, too well known to dwell upon at this time. I shall soon, I hope, signify in the usual formal manner my acceptance of the nomination which has been tendered to me. In the meantime I gladly greet you all as co-workers in a noble cause.

Eighteen months in prison without trial was the lot of Daniel Sweeney. An American citizen, he appealed to his Government, which ignored his appeals and allowed and approved the imprisonment. Such is Mr. Blaine's foreign policy. The Democratic policy is, as expressed by Gov. Cleveland, a fair and speedy trial of American citizens charged with crimes in foreign lands, so that the innocent may go free and the guilty be punished. The party does not, however, believe in bullying, guano swindles, etc., any more than it does in railroad lobbying or Jax. G. Blaine.

If Mr. Blaine is an innocent and a maligned man, if his record is really clear, if he is a statesman of undoubted ability and approved prudence, now is the time to establish these facts and to confound those who condemn him. And if Mr. Blaine's organs don't begin soon to deal with his record, the inevitable conclusion will be that they dare not. We doubt whether this is a good year for a hurrah campaign under any circumstances and we are quite confident that it is not a good year for the Republican party to hurrah with its mouth while working whitewash brushes with its hands.—Portland Oregonian, Republican, April 21, 1884.
