Scandalous.

An obscure and unimportant paper published in Buffalo, N. Y., a Police Gazette, a paper whose object is to cater to vitiated minds, and from which source criticism is the highest praise, accuses Gov. Cleveland of gross immoralities. That disgrace to journalism makes charges but as yet has offered no proofs. Gov. Cleveland denies the same. There is a Republican paper published at Buffalo; it is the leading paper of Western New York, and is an ardent supporter of the Republican National Ticket. That journal says that the whole thing is a blackmailing scheme, abetted and aided by a disreputable sheet. The editor of the Telegraph has been in the penitentiary four times, so says the Express. A virtuous character, indeed! And then to be so scandalized at other's transgressions! It would truly spoil his reputation to tell a lie! In speaking of this man's accusations against Cleveland, Carl Schurz says:

"The scandalous stories recently circulated about Cleveland's private character have, to my knowledge, been inquired into by several parties, separately, by men of high standing in Buffalo, by a clerical gentleman on the editorial staff of the Independent, and by others, and the report of all of them, as they have come to me, based upon a conscientious study of the facts in the case, agree in pronouncing these stories monstrous calumnies on the man, which will recoil upon the inventors. The public will undoubtedly hear more from the investigators through the press. With this conviction I stand here speaking for Gov. Cleveland."

We hope that when the records of Blaine's little affair of the same kind is published, the Oregonian will print them "merely as a matter of news."

Tilden Indorses the Ticket.

Democrats have been waiting for Samuel J. Tilden's indorsement of their ticket. It was made public on the 29th of July, at Albany, but Blaine's Associated Press declined to give it to the country. The mail brought it. Here it is:

Although I cannot be present in person with my old friends in Albany on that interesting occasion, I cordially co-operate with them in the support of the excellent ticket nominated by the Democratic National Convention, and feel assured that in its success at the election, of which there is every promise, the country will achieve a substantial victory for the cause of good government.

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Aug. 5.—Calvin Page, Democrat, is chosen mayor over W. H. Size, Republican, by a vote of 1063 to 434, the smallest Republican vote cast in the city for many years. The Democrats for the first time in seven years, elect a majority of the city officers, securing thirteen of the nineteen councilmen and six of the nine aldermen.
