Flunked.

That immaculate gentleman, who a little over one month ago was full of fire and fury at the Indianapolis Sentinel, has found it needful to write a letter of explanation to the country concerning the *libel*. Instead of the big browbeating, swelling words of a month ago we have the most abject and craven letter that ever a candidate has put his name to. Instead of vengeance he now begs for pity. Coward and bully, this letter proves him to be, if we knew naught else of him. From this man we owe the Cleveland scandal, to him personally, for there is strong evidence that Jas. G. Blaine made it an issue, secured its insertion in a respectable paper, which had refused the wild farrago of nonsense and folly. To Jas. G. Blaine therefore we owe no consideration but justice.

There is in this whole thing a rare vein of humor, which might be dramatized worthily only by a Shakespeare. He would have to draw Iago without courage, Shylock without dignity, and the swaggering swash buckler Pistol in his entirety. That makes Jas. G. Blaine, cunning, avarice and cowardice. And then to paint his shuffling and ridiculous inconsistencies. A man with such keen-edged honor that he sought a vindication by telegraph, man who could not wait a month, a man who seeks to vindicate his honor touched in its most delicate spot *twenty-seven years after the story was fully published*.

Does Mr. Blaine tell the truth when he relates the secret marriage? We believe not. The law is very stringent against secret marriages in Kentucky. It provides a heavy fine and imprisonment in the penitentiary to the officiating officer or minister. It is a wildly improbable story that any person would invite these penalties. Mr. Blaine in his letter forgot to tell one thing, the name of the person who married him. He tells nothing unless under compulsion. In Kentucky the local papers publish a list of the marriage licenses weekly. Yet a clever young man like Blaine did not know that a marriage license was indispensable after residing there two years. Here is something that will nail that lie told by Mr. Blaine, as we believe it to be, the date being three months subsequent to the first secret marriage, at a time when Jas. G. Blaine was living with his illegally wedded wife.

Know all men by these presents that we, William A. McKim and Jas. G. Blaine, are held and firmly bound to the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the sum of \$500 current money, for the payment of which to be made to the said Commonwealth we bind ourselves our heirs, executors, and administrators jointly and severally, by these presents, sealed and dated this 3d day of October, A. D. 1850. The condition of the above obligation is such that if there is no lawful cause to obstruct a marriage between William A. McKim and Miss Sarah E. Stanwood of Bourbon county for which a license is now obtained, then this obligation be void or else in full force.
