The Right to Vote.

In all elections not otherwise provided for by the Constitution of the State of Oregon, every male citizen of the United States, of the age of 21 years and upwards, who shall have resided in the State during the six months immediately preceding such election, and shall have declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States one year preceding such election, conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization shall be entitled to vote at all elections authorized by law.

The Republican majority in Maine has settled down to 15,411. This is official. The majority in 1876 was 15,444; in 1879 it was 21,176. The average has been barely maintained.

### The Star Route Thievery.

Wayne MacVeagh, the Attorney General of Garfield's Administration, said on leaving the cabinet, that if the new regime was earnest in its attempts that all the star routes could be punished. That the evidence of their guilt is positive and glaring admits of no doubt.

The crime and results are that over five million dollars have been stolen, and for the crime no man has been punished but one.

The two chief conspirators, Parker and Salisbury were not even indicted. Salisbury is a brother-in-law of Jas. G. Blaine. That may account for his escape. The witness, who turned United States evidence against Salisbury, upon the promise of immunity from MacVeagh, was prosecuted by MacVeagh's successor and sent to prison. He was a small agent of Salisbury and possessed but little influence. He was well punished for his lapse into honesty.

The star route gang were all at Chicago. Steve Elkins, of New Mexico as manager, and Tom Donaldson, of Idaho, Keerons of St. Louis, as agents, of Blaine.

Wayne MacVeagh, who initiated these suits, it will be remembered tendered Garfield his resignation when the latter through Blaine's influence nominated a tricky and unscrupulous lawyer for a position that would give him an inside view of the Government's case. Garfield leaned to MacVeagh and the nomination was withdrawn.

The conclusion of these cases is a burlesque, and a farce. It is more, it is a burning disgrace to every American citizen. It justifies the European reproaches that are heaped on this Government for corruption. It justifies the saying of Wayne MacVeagh, the "Republican party has but three principles and they are—spoils, spoils, spoils."

### A Republican.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—The Times has the following letter purporting to be from a Republican Elector: "I am one of the thirty-six unfortunate Republicans who have been designated to cast, if elected, the electoral vote of the State for that eminent politician, James G. Blaine. Now, if per chance we are elected, will it be legal to cast my vote in writing in the following manner:

Electoral vote—District. In order to advance the work of the party of moral ideas, the grand old Republican party, and in order to promote honesty, economy and political reform in the administration, this vote is cast to elevate to the chief place in the party and Government an unsuccessful stock-broker and bond manipulator, that eminent trickster and tried and proved liar, James G. Blaine. Magnetism and civil service reform forever.

If things appear a little mixed in the foregoing it is due the confusing effect on one's mind of trying to reconcile duty to conscience with seeming duty to the Republican party and of keeping all quiet here, in the faint hope that through doing evil good may come. If you can enlighten me in any way so that I can vote the Republican ticket and still retain my self-respect as an honest man, you will greatly oblige me and many other Republicans still groping in darkness. Yours, uncertainly, 'Keep my name quiet.' (Blaine Mulligan.)"

### The Stalwart Retort.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—The Evening Post publishes a Boston dispatch giving the statement of a prominent Stalwart who lately had a conference with Roscoe Conkling, in which Conkling said Butler will not poll more than 20,000 votes in New York State. As an offset to this there are the disaffected Stalwarts, who will prevent Blaine from capturing New York. He also said the Independent Republicans exceeded the Blaine Irish-Americans, which is another conclusive argument against the possibility of Blaine carrying the Empire State. The gentleman also said that Conkling was the recognized leader of the New York Stalwarts, and all work during the campaign had been done under his direction. Recently a number of New York and Boston Stalwarts held a meeting in New York, when it was decided to prepare an address, which is now finished and will be sent where it will do the most good from the Atlantic to the Pacific. A friend of Conkling's said to-night that the address will directly advise Republicans to vote against Blaine.
