

The Elections

It is now conceded by nearly every paper in New York State, except the Tribune, that Cleveland has carried the State by about 1200 plurality, which assures his election to the Presidency. Every county in the State except New York City and Brooklyn has sent in its official returns and they bear out the former estimates made. In the language of the N. Y. Chairman of the Democratic State Committee, "that Cleveland has carried this State is now as definitely ascertained as any historical event."

Cleveland carried Connecticut by about 1500 majority, New Jersey by 3000, Indiana by 7,500, Virginia by 10,000 and West Virginia by 2000, with the South giving the Democratic nominees 219 electoral votes, 18 more than necessary to elect.
