

to suppose, than the Oregonian or any placeman, "trying to create a bitter feeling between the two races in order to create political capital." The following dispatch did not appear in the Oregonian, although it was telegraphed by the Associated Press to the S. F. papers:

NEW ORLEANS, November 21.—Finchbeck, the most prominent colored man in the State and now Mayor of this port, was interviewed yesterday, and said: "I do not believe in the election of Cleveland and the fact that the Democratic party will again come into power or will prove injurious to the welfare of the colored people of the South. All of the colored people who are trying to create a bitter feeling between the two races in order to manufacture political capital. The colored people are not changed or affected in the least by a mere change of Administration. In my opinion the success of Cleveland will do more to destroy race prejudice than ten thousand Civil Rights bills. I think the election of Cleveland will result finally in a political revolution in the South, which will completely destroy the color line. New parties will be formed, composed of both races, in which each member will be equal and will take part in all the proceedings. Of course this order of things will not be brought about immediately after Cleveland's inauguration, but it will come."

A few weeks prior to the election the Oregonian had a long editorial upon the political complexion of Nevada, in which it said all the respectable people had left the State, and that it was simply a rotten borough, therefore, it was certain that it would go for Cleveland and Hendricks. We have no doubt that it is correct in his idea of it being a very corrupt place and on that account we were not surprised at its casting its electoral vote for Blaine and Logan. It only followed in its natural bearing in doing so. Brother Scott now says its one of the purest spots on earth. "Consistency, that's art a jewel."
