GENTLEMEN OF THE COUNCIL:

GENTLEMEN OF THE COUNCIL:

In accordance with my duties as your presiding officer, I herewith submit for your consideration the financial and general condition of the city. It affords me much satisfaction in saying to you that as a municipality we are in a healthy, prespectus condition financially and otherwise, and that while our friends in the Eastern States are just beginning to thaw out we have enjoyed two months of uninterrupted fine weather, with all the beauties of spring; and our little city and its surrounding hills are clothed in rich verdure and bedecked with beautiful flowers. The health is exceptionally good, as it generally is, when compared with other localities.

For a detailed statement of the finances I

For a detailed statement of the linances I would respectfully refer you to the report of the Treasurer, which shows an aggregate receipts amounting to \$6018 56. Total disbursements \$5,450 84. Balance on hand \$587.72, with no indebtedness. There is still a delinquent tax amounting to about \$351, some of which is not collectable. I will say in connecwhich is not collectable. I will say in connection with this, there is no necessity for any delinquents at the end of the year if the collector will do his duty, and the taxpayers should not feel hard toward the marshal for doing his duty as required by law. I say this in justification of the marshal, who sometimes incurs the displeasure of those who are disposed to be tardy. The tax should be collected as promptly as possible and not suffer bills to go unpaid.

There have been erected within the city the past year about sixty houses at the cost of about \$100,009. An established grade has been fixed on Williamette street from first to eleventh streets and graded to it at a cost of about \$1500 to the property holders and city, and now presents a neat and fine appearance.

The fire department and apparatus for extinguishing fires are well organized and in excel condition. Three hundred fact of new

Three hundred feet of new hose have been purchased, so that we now have a sufficient length to reach any building. There were only fifty-four prosecutions made during the last year, and when we consider that we had on several oreasins over 1000 transient people here attending the shows, county fair within the limits of the city, celebrations and political gatherings. I think the fact is remarkable and speaks well for the faithfulness and efficiency of our police force, and while we have the advantage of the State University and good school buildings and the reputation of being one of the most prosperous towns in the valley, we ought as a community do all we can to induce good acquisitions to our population, make it pleasant for the stranger.

MORTGAGE TAX LAW.

Suit was Tuscilay commenced in the United States District Court by the Dundee Mortgage and Trust Company against the following Sheriffs: J F Grover, of Polk county; W Knight, of Clackanas; Sol King, of Benton; G A Taylor, of Douglas; J R Campbell, of Lane; Wm Martin, of Umatilla; B P Cornelius, of Washington; J K Charlton, of Lion; E B Collard, of Yambilli Thomas Jordan, of Multnomah; S B Parrish. Chief of Police of the City of Portland.

For cause of action the plaintiffs first set orth that it is a foreign corporation with head narters at Dundee, Scotland, and is the owner of a large number of promissory notes secured by mortgages on real estate situated in the various counties of Oregon. It is further alleged that generally these notes are made payable at Dundee. A numnotes are made payable at Dundee. A number of loans were made before the passage of the mortgage tax law, and loans amounting to many thousands of dollars have been made since. Under the provisions of the mortgage tax the defendants have assessed the following loans against plaintiff:

Polk county, \$96,408.89; Clackamas, \$2,-727.94; Benton, \$48,636.21; Douglas, \$28,000; Lane, \$44,735.54; Umatilla, \$19,850; Washington, \$3.940.60; Liun, \$151,340.11; Multnemah, \$118,200, City of Pertland, \$95,900.

It is also alleged that E B Collins, Sheriff of Yamhill county, has made, or is about to make, a Sheriff's assessment against the phintiff, the amount of which is unknown. That each of the defendants have warrants in their hands for the collection of taxes on said assessments. If these are sold as delinquent it will cloud and greatly impair plaintiff's title to said mortgages. For various reasons set forth in the complaint it is claimed that the mortgage tax act under which these assessments are made by declaimed that the moregage which these assessments are made by defendants is unconstitutional. Plaintiff urges that as other property is taxed at one-third of its actual value, mortgages should be tracted in a like manner. Wherefore for treated in a like manner.
