The Senate and the Administration.

In view of a possible conflict between the administration and senate over the appointments, the question of Democratic control of that body two years hence becomes more important to the party. On the 31 day of March 1887, the terms of twenty-five senators--sixteen Republicans and nine Democrats--will expire. The Republicans who go out then are: Messrs Miller of California, Hawley, Harrison, Hale, Dawes, Conger, McMillan, Van Wyck, Sewell, Miller of New York, Sherman, Mitchell, Aldrich, Edmunds, Mahone and Sawyer. The outgoing Democratic senators two years hence are: Messrs Gray, Jones of Florida, Gorman, George, Cockrell, Fair, Jackson, Maxey and Camden. Assuming that a Republican will be sent from Oregon, and counting Riddleberger of Virginia with that party, the senate will stand next winter forty-two Republicans to thirty-four Democrats: In order to get control of the senate the Democrats would have to carry fourteen of the twenty-five seats to be filled by election for 1887. That is, they would have to hold nine seats to be vacated by Democrats and gain five from others besides.

The Democrats are confident of electing successors to Mahone and Harrison. Virginia is now Democratic and the Democrats have a big advantage in the number of their state senators, who hold over for the senatorial election in Indiana two years hence. Besides they have redistricted the State to their advantage. According to these two seats to the Democrats, they would have to gain but three more and they would have fighting chances in California, Connecticut, New Jersey and New York and Ohio. Of the outgoing Republicans in 1887, the States of Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont and Wisconsin are counted upon as safe to return Republicans, but the Democrats claim that they have good prospects for a Senator in Wisconsin. It will readily be seen that the Democrats have at least fair prospects of controlling the only remaining Republican branch of the government before the expiration of the present presidential term.

The Southern States.

It must be a satisfaction to the Republican press to note the quiet, uninterrupted prosperity of the Southern States. The gloomy foreboding of what might happen if the Democracy were restored to power, have been unrealized. The assertion that numbers of Southern Democrats would be imported to fill the offices in Northern States has in no case been verified, nor has the wild rush of Southern office seekers to Washington occurred, on the contrary the Southern office seekers are fewer proportionately than their Northern brethren. And then the absurd delusions that the rebel debt would be paid, and that the former owners would be remunerated for their slaves and that damages done to the property of Confederates would be paid for out of the U. S. Treasury, who now believes one of them. No right of the colored man has been, or will be, taken from him and his race throughout the South are no longer misled by the reports of designing men.

The steady, enduring growth of the South in wealth and industries could never occur in a section where violence and mob law held sway. They are incompatible and cannot exist together. The upward growth of the South cannot fail to excite the admiration of every true American citizen, which, no doubt, it does.

Defaulter Hibbs has a nice sense of humor, which not even a residence in the Canadian dominion has blunted. He stole \$15,000 of the Government funds by an ingenious system, yet he now complains that a registered letter containing \$600 which he sent to a friend has never reached its destination. He refrains from saying whether the money in this confiscated letter was a portion of the stolen funds or whether it was the proceeds of honest industry. The only proper career for Hibbs is that of a professional humorist. All our lesser lights would pale before him, if this letter is a sample of his power.

Miss Cleveland's book has already reached its fourth edition. Its sale will be unprecedented, considering the nature of the work, probably reaching 100,000.

The South in the Union Army.

The New York Evening Post (Rep.) has made some interesting calculations from the statistics of the number of men in the Union army and the parts of the country from which they came. The whole number of Union soldiers, from the firing on Fort Sumter to the end of the war, was 3,859,132, of which the Northern States furnished 2,390,091. The census of 1860 showed that there were 3,936,503 men of military age, between 18 and 45 years, in the Northern States, so that the whole number of troops furnished by them was just short of 61 per cent. The percentage varied largely in the different States; New Hampshire sent 54 per cent, and Indiana, which was held to be a very strong Copperhead region, 74 per cent.

It is surprising, however, that the State which furnished the largest number of Union troops in proportion to her population was the old slave State of Delaware. In 1860 she had 18,273 white males between the ages of 18 and 45, and she sent 13,670 men into the Union army, which was 74.8 per cent. Rhode Island, the next smaller State, sent 66 per cent; and next to Indiana, which sent 74, Kansas sent 72 per cent.

Maryland, another border State in had Union repute, sent 49 per cent. of her military population. Kentucky, whose Governor made an insolent reply to President Lincoln's summons, nevertheless sent 79,025 out of 180,589 of the army age, or nearly 44 per cent. Missouri sent 47 per cent, and Tennessee, which actually seceded, furnished 31,092 men to the Union ranks. The half-dozen border States gave 315,282 men to defend the Union. From other Southern States came 23,045, making a total of 338,327, or about one-eighth of the Union forces, from the old slave States. The Post shows the non-partisan character of the army from such facts as that while Delaware gave Lincoln less than one-quarter of her votes, and Vermont more than three quarters, yet Vermont sent only 58 per cent of her available men into the army, and Delaware nearly 75 per cent. The Post concludes its interesting analysis by saying:

"The Southern men who fought for the Union have enjoyed, perhaps, the sweetest victory ever vouchsafed to the champions of a righteous cause." They have not only seen the cause triumph when but for their help it must seemingly have failed; they have also lived to see the men of their own States over whom they have triumphed confessing their satisfaction that the contest ended as it did."

The cholera has now crept up to the old city of Carassonne, in the French Pyrenees, although the officials of the department deny that any case has appeared. This is the same mistaken policy which was adopted in Italy last year, and which did so much to spread the disease. It will be next to a miracle if France or Italy escapes from the cholera this year, and the moment that it is known to be in a place the news should be spread in order that adjoining provinces may adopt a still more rigorous quarantine. Instead of this, the custom has been to lie about it until the disease gains such headway that further mendacity is useless. No better plan could be adopted for spreading the disease.

We don't see any reference to Mr. Tilden's health in the Republican papers nowadays. Probably the old yarns are now in soak to be brought out again about convention time in 1888.

The President still continues his labors at the White House. It is said that the Republican office holders desire that he take a good long vacation.
