An Albany exchange says: "Father Upchurch was the founder of the organization known as the A. O. U. W. He is now in California, and about the 25th of next month he will visit this State, and, we are informed, he will visit Eugene. He was born in North Carolina in 1820, and hence is sixty-five years of age. In 1845 he settled in Pennsylvania, and entered the employ of the Pennsylvania railroad, in the shops as master mechanic, where he remained for over twenty years. During his stay here he saw various ways in which the life of the mechanic might be improved. The first thought was to bring employer and employed more closely together in fraternal relations, and as a result of his thoughts upon this subject Jefferson Lodge, No. 1, A. O. U. W., of Meadville, Penn., was organized on October 27, 1868. Out of this small beginning has grown a powerful organization, numbering 150,000 members. The membership here are looking forward with much interest to the old gentleman's visit."

One of the best stories told of President Cleveland lately is to the effect that when a member of Congress was urging him recently to appoint one of his constituents to office he mildly inquired how long the applicant had been in Washington. "He has been here nearly three months on expense," was the reply, "and he is growing very anxious." "Very good," said the President, "if your friend has any business he has been neglecting it severely for three months and he would probably neglect the Government's business in the same way if I should appoint him. If he has no business to neglect he is not the kind of man wanted at present in the Government service." That settled it, and in this particular instance the amiable President was not imposed on.

"Ex-Rebel," John S. Wise, has been nominated by the Virginia Republicans for Governor. He was but seventeen years old when he entered Gen. Lee's army and he fought till that army surrendered. Then, as he had not had enough of it, he went down to North Carolina and joined Gen. Johnston's army till it in turn laid down its arms. Very few "ex-rebels" have a bloodier fighting record. The Republican press is now praising him and saying he was a brave confederate soldier—all same Mosby, Longstreet and others, who joined the Republican party simply for office. These same individuals now flaunt the bloody shirt, however.

General Charles P. Stone, the engineer-in-chief of the pedestal for the Statue of Liberty, was an officer in the late war. He relates that in April, 1861, much anxiety was felt on Washington as to President Lincoln's safety, and that one night he saw more than fifty men, among whom were the Hon. Cassius M. Clay and General Lane, gathered in the East Room of the White House, each with a musket. They were a voluntary guard, which had resolved to be there every night, and see to it that Mr. Lincoln's person was protected.—Harpur's Weekly.

The remains of General U. S. Grant will be buried in Riverside Park, New York City, on Saturday, August 8th. Great preparations, under the management of Gen. W. S. Hancock, are being made for the funeral ceremonies. Eugene should make preparations to hold proper memorial services on that day.

The Democrats of old Virginia have nominated Gen. Fitzhugh Lee as their candidate for Governor. He is a man of known honesty and integrity, and will be elected over Mahone's man Wise by a majority that will forever, we hope, banish such creatures as Mahone and Riddleberger from American politics.

A number of our exchanges are publishing the statement that Mrs. Dunaway was presented with a basket of eggs, one at a time, during her late visit to Jacksonville. This the Jacksonville Times says, is entirely a mistake as she came and went unmolested.

Postmaster-General Vilas predicts Democratic victories at the next elections to be held in Wisconsin, Michigan and Illinois.

The restoration of the Democratic party to power is at once a proof and a pledge of national union, based on mutual esteem and confidence, and inspired by the consciousness of common interest and common destiny. The vigor and persistency with which this is inculcated by the Administration is very disturbing to many Republican organs and politicians, some of whom are betraying symptoms of serious nervous derangement. It is difficult for them to grasp the fact that the war is over; that the "grand old party" has been turned out to graze in infinite space, and that a Democratic President is doing what he can to repair the wrongs and correct the evils of twenty years of Republican fraud, corruption and sectional hate.

His name is written upon the annals of benevolence through the records of more than three generations of men, and he will go to his grave honored as the greatest philanthropist of his ancient race. Sir Moses celebrated his one hundredth birthday last October, and his death was merely the stopping of life's machinery after an incessant wearing of nearly one hundred and one years.

Is it a Stragetic Movement?

Since the late decision of Judge Deady on the mortgage tax law, some of the parties in Portland who represent the interests of foreign loan associations have written to Sheriff Charlton of this county tendering him payment of taxes on mortgages recorded in Lane county assessed against them, offering to pay 25 per cent of such assessment. Sheriff Charlton, being a very benevolent man, responded by letter accepting the tender. Though several days have elapsed since the correspondence, nothing further has transpired and no money has been sent. We would like to know if similar tenders have been made to the Sheriffs of other counties interested, and what the result has been, whether they accepted or rejected such tender, if any has been made them.—Albany Bulletin.

Sheriff Campbell informs us that he has received from one of the loan companies a letter of similar import, and that he assured the company at once that he would accept the 25 per cent tendered as partial payment of their taxes in Lane county. However, the representative of the company in Portland has not yet remitted the amount.

Swamp Lands.

The people of Grant and Klamath counties will be much interested in a recent decision by Secretary Lamar in a swamp land case from California. After setting out the facts and citing the statutes on the subject, the Secretary says: "A careful consideration of all the evidence shows that the said tract is subject to periodical overflows in the winter or spring months, but the overflow subsides so as to not render the land unfit for cultivation by reason of the overflow. The land, therefore, is not swamp and overflowed land within the meaning of the swamp land act, and the claim of the State must be rejected." This decision will cause to revert to the public domain nine-tenths of what has been gobbled in this State under the swamp land act.—Portland Standard.


