The Prominent Candidates.

Gov. Moody hopes that Senatorial lightning will strike him at the extra session. He thinks it "a matter of vital importance" to the people that Z. F. Moody should have a seat in the U. S. Senate at a cost of \$30,000 to the state.

We knew all the time that the study of ancient history would result in some startling discoveries and resurrection. The political tomb of Major General Geo. H. Williams has been opened and that tough old veteran and war-horse now snuffs the breeze of battle.

Recently we made mention in these columns of the fact that Judge O. N. Denny had been tendered by the Chinese government the high and responsible position of chief adviser of the emperor of "all the Chinas," at the modest little salary of \$12,000 per annum.

There is also another Richmond in the field in the person of Hon. John H. Mitchell and his partisans are whooping it up lively, but he will fail for lack of votes. There will be no scarcity of candidates, and that is the most gratifying feature of the situation.

Prof Chas W. Roby has been appointed Postmaster at Portland vice Geo. A. Steel, time expired. The successful applicant has been a resident of Portland for six years, having come to that city from La Crosse, Wisconsin. He has been identified with the Democratic party for the past fifteen years and was endorsed by 1,000 Democrats of Portland for the place.

General Grant's last words as just published to the world by his son Fred are an appeal for peace between the two sections formerly at war. "I feel," he said, "that we are on the eve of a new era, when there is to be great harmony between the Federals and the Confederates. I cannot stay to be a living witness to the correctness of the prophecy, but I feel within me that it is to be so. The universally kind feeling expressed for me at a time when it was supposed that each day would prove my last seems to me the beginning of the answer 'Let us have peace.'"

We have it on high Republican authority that Mr. Scott, of the Oregonian, asked Gov. Moody to appoint him to the U. S. Senate. Mr. Scott has done more real, solid work for the Republican party than any ten men in the State, is an able man and would attract attention at Washington, and deserves the position at the hands of his party, but he couldn't get it just because of his qualifications.

Will the Democrats help to organize the Legislature, even if they do attend is a question that deserves to be well considered by the Republicans. No organization; no Senator. Once again we call their attention to this fact.

Here is the old rebel yell for you, this time by Fitzhugh Lee of Virginia. Gen. Lee is no street bully, and in that respect cannot begin to compare with Brigadier General Mahone of the late confederacy or Lieutenant John S. Wise, but is supposed to be possessed of an idea or two and knows how to express them. If the following sentiments are not acceptable to Republicans it is no matter as Gen. Lee was addressing Democrats, and struck the chords that vibrate in every Democratic bosom: "I thank God that white-winged peace now broods over the land. I came here to preach peace and not war; to carry as my standard the stars and stripes, and not the bloody shirt. I thank God that the question of secession is forever settled, and that now, at last, in our glorious old flag has a meaning. I thank God that no vestige of carpetbagism or scalawag government remains to vex the people."

The milliner is well nigh as potent in breaking up polygamy in Utah as the efforts of Judge Zane. Old Brigham Young groaned in spirit and foretold the ruin in store for the Saints when tin plates were discarded in his harem and calico dresses and sun bonnets ceased to be the only wear of womankind. Every year since has witnessed a larger incursion of Gentiles and a more general desire among Mormon women to be clothed in more costly raiment like unto their sisters who are not in polygamy. The direct result has been to make polygamy very costly to the Mormon who resides in city or town, and there is good ground for the assertion that the Saints would welcome a revelation against plural marriage if it were not for the fact that it would be attributed to fear of the new law.

Vegetables are raised in Greenland, despite its short summers. At the Danish station of Godthaab, latitude 64 degrees, near the sea, radishes, turnips and lettuce are grown. About 30 miles further north, in the inland country, the climate is milder, and cabbage and carrots do well, while potatoes grow freely. In South Greenland—the site of the old Norsemen's settlements—horticulture is practiced under the most favorable circumstances.

Gen. Butler is no longer the friend of the workman. In a recent interview he said: "Nine out of ten of them would sell their votes for \$2 apiece. I was a fool to think this age was any different from any other. 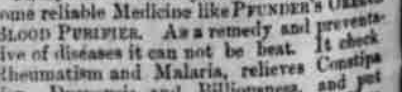
