Obituary.
Died, in this city, Sunday, January 3, 1886,
at 3:10 p m Mrs Martha Alice Hoult-Belshaw
aged 28 years, 10 months and 24 days.
The remains were taken to Harrisburg by
Monday's train and interred in the Masonic

ed to her last resting place. Dr E R Geary,

sburg. She was graduated at the Academy of
the Sacred Heart, in Salem, Oregon. She

February 27, 1884, and since that she has lived
in Lane county. Only two weeks prior to her
decease a baby boy was born to her, who is left
innocent of his great loss. Mrs Belshaw was
universally beloved and the dread summons
suddenly struck a chill to the heart of
many a friend. And her true, pure woman-
hood, and noble qualities won the respect and
love of all, and increases the sorrow and regret
with which her loss is felt.
She leaves an orphaned child, a widowed
husband, a grief stricken father, mourning
sisters and brother, who have the sympathy
of the people of Eugene in their great bereave-
ment.
