Large numbers of them can now be seen in the trees in and about Prescott.

America has a Grotna Green, Jeffersonville, Ind. One of the street signs reads: "Marrying done here. Licenses secured for elopers." One justice there in eight years has performed 1,487 marriages. The witness fee for swearing that a girl is over eighteen when she is not averages about one dollar, though there are a few professional witnesses who cut rates to secure business.

Mr. Blaine made a speech in favor of the Home-rule bill. Lane County Elect the Entire Ticket Except Surveyor, Sheriff and Representative, and Clerk.

Democrats Celebrate.

In the State the Democrats have made wonderful gains. Hon. Sylvester Pennoyer has been elected Governor by about 2,000 majority, notwithstanding the Republicans carried the State by nearly 2300 majority two years ago. Geo. W. Webb is elected State Treasurer by about 1500 majority; and R. S. Strahan is elected Supreme Judge in all probability by a small majority, although the result is yet in doubt. The Republicans elected Hermann for Congress by 2,000; McElroy, Superintendent of Public Instruction, 1500; McBride, Secretary of State, 500 majority; Baker, State Printer, 1,500 majority.

The House is Democratic while the Senate is Republican.

Three cheers for the lion hearted Democracy of Oregon. Though defeated again and again, they have the proud consciousness that they were deserving of success. The Democratic officers, we are confident, will give the people a safe, prudent, economical administration of State affairs. In the interest of Democracy and better government we hope that these desirable ends may be accomplished.

In Lane county the Democrats have done remarkably well. We elect the State Senator, three representatives, two commissioners, treasurer, school superintendent, assessor and coroner, while the opposition elect one Representative, clerk sheriff and surveyor. In another column the official vote will be found.

By an order issued by President Cleveland a short time ago, the country known as the Moses reservation has been thrown open to settlement. The government contracted with Chief Moses more than two years for the relinquishment of his reservation and the settlement of his tribe on the Colville reservation. By this treaty the government agreed to erect certain mills and school houses which were not completed until this spring. The Moses reservation lies north and west of the Columbia river and embraces 2,233,047 acres of rich agricultural, pasture, timber and mineral lands, including a large part of the famous Similkameen mining region. Settlers, stockmen and miners are now going there in large numbers.

Gladstone has been defeated in his attempt to give Ireland a just Government, by a majority of 30 votes in the House of Commons. He will appeal to the people, and the probability is that he will be beaten. The opposition are reviving dead and gone memories, and seeking to awaken old prejudices and animosities. The magnificent oratory of Gladstone has conclusively shown that the paths of peace, prosperity and security to the British Empire lead from some such measure as he proposes granting Ireland.

The Democratic candidates at Cottage Grove, got their party vote, and Mr. Veatch ran way ahead of his party vote. Cottage Grove is Senator Veatch's home and it is perfectly natural that he should run well there, as Mr. Dick did in his home. The Democratic candidates are satisfied. Therefore we see no reason why a Republican organ weeps and re-fuses to be comforted unless it is in revenge of the castigation received at the hands of our new Senator.

Geo. W. Webb will handle the funds of the State for the next four years.

Statistics compiled by the department of agriculture show that the world's product of wheat in 1885 was 2,110,000,000 bushels, the requirements of consumption 2,165,000,000 bushels, presenting a deficiency of 55,000,000 bushels drawn from the previous year's surplus of 125,000,000 bushels. They find the product of Europe a medium, those of India and Australia large and a heavy reduction in the United States. For the supply of the coming year, the crops of Australia, India and South America, already harvested, are probably about 32,000,000 bushels less than those of last year, while those of the United States promise fully 100,000,000 bushels more than the harvest of 1885. The wheat in the United States on May 1st, last, was 104,000,000 bushels against 152,000,000 bushels in 1885. The estimated acreage of winter wheat now growing is 24,727,087; spring wheat 11,800,000 total 36,527,087.

Fort Worth, Tex., has forgotten the great strike in the excitement of a novel law suit. Two men were suitors for the hand of the same girl, and one has sued out an injunction against any minister or magistrate commanding him not to marry the lady to his rival. He has stationed an officer at her gate ready to serve it if there are any symptoms of a wedding.

The Boston Traveller says that at a recent wedding near Boston the bride entered on her uncle's arm, and was met at the church by the groom. The uncle then retired in good order, took his seat in the body of the church, and when the clergyman asked, "Who gives this woman, &c., away in his place and loudly and emphatically said "Me."

President Grevy, of France, now nearly eighty of age, lost his first tooth the other day. The Paris journals mention the fact as an event, and the Voltaire regards it as an event of grave political significance.
