We say let up on that kind of "elevating American labor."

Jeff Davis' daughter Winnie, who was recently given a salute by the Confederate soldiers home and decorated with the badge of membership in R E Lee camp, has written a letter for the North American Review, which has been accepted. The article treats of the Irish question, and it is said that in it she pleads most eloquently for Ireland's constitutional freedom. In her new field of labor may Winnie win.

The harrowing political fictions about the South, which so largely shape the direction of votes in the North, are sent out by a man named George Jackson, of Millen, Georgia. Recently he was caught and signed the following paper: "I, this day, August 25th, 1886, state and give my signature, in the presence of well known citizens of Millen, that I have proven myself a liar and a man who communicates lies to Northern journalism for a support."

And now Thos J Brady, of Star-route fame, is said to be writing a book which is to pillory several statesmen hitherto supposed to be immaculate. Mr Brady says he has shielded a lot of hypocrites long enough, and now that he is going to let the light of truth shine on them. This is what he should have done in the first place. Why has he waited all these years? Has he, too, played the hypocrite?—Portland Telegram. This is a Republican view of Brady since he threatens to "tell the truth."

We take the following from the "Courier de San Francisco," of Sept 23d, the leading French journal on the coast. Its politics hitherto have been strongly Republican: "The truth is that since the accession of the Democratic party to power, its adversaries hardly know what to do in order to stir public sentiment. Since the elevation of Mr Cleveland to the Presidency, not only has he removed all pretenses from the pessimists who had predicted, as a consequence of his election, no end of disasters, but further than this he has made each day new conquests in the ranks of his former enemies, and he is gaining popularity among the great masses of the people."
