The premium receipts include these worthless notes, but they make the figures respectable large and give a fictitious appearance of prosperity that deceives many inexperienced persons." * * * The prediction of the speedy end of the State Insurance Company is an equally safe venture in the line of prophecy, for no company conducted as it is, with little or much capital, can long survive under the most favorable loss experience possible."

In Cuba, two hours before a paper is allowed distributed on the street, a copy must be sent, with the editor's name, to the Government, and one to the Censor. When the paper is returned with the Censor's endorsement, the paper may go out to the public. One of the newspapers in Havana disregards the law, publishes what it pleases, and when it gets ready. Every few weeks the Government fines the editor and suppresses the paper. The next day the paper appears under a new name. Its frequent brushes with the Government advertises it, and the people buy it to see what new indiscretion it had committed. The subscription price is \$24 a year.

There will be \$1200 given in premiums as follows: First premium, \$100; second \$200; third, \$100; and \$300 first premium; \$150 second, and \$50 third for boy bands. The entrance fee will be \$1.50 for each member of bands wishing to compete.
