A Foul Murder.

Particulars of the shocking murder of D Corker, a hardware merchant of Lafayette, have been received. The victim was a bathelor, and when found was lying on the bed with his arms cut and broken, and his Frank Dunlap and W B Bailey could not face cut diagonally across one side from the eye to the further end of the chin. Just above the eye there was a fearful gash in M Veatch, M Robinson, T S Carter, S B the skull. Examination disclosed the fact Jackson, Jefferson McCollough and J M that entrance was effected by removing a pane of glass from a rear window, and exit by the same means. The assassin or assassins on entering placed a table against the partition surrounding Corker's sleeping Day. The Court appointed the following bailiffs apartment and climbed over it. An axe covered with blood, found near the window, shows plainly that this was the instrument used, and the fact that Corker's trunk was broken and several hundred dollars abstracted from a shot pouch shows that robbery was the object for committing the terrible crime. There was no evidence of a struggle, but the wounds on Corker's arms lead to the belief that he became partly conscious when assaulted and threw up his arms with a view of protecting himself. The blows from the axe must have been delivered with fearful force, as the head of the bedstead o cupied by the murdered man was broken down, Coroner D C Narver of McMinnville was notified and took charge of the remains. He summoned a coroner's jury and held a partial inquest, which was concluded Wednesday. Corker was 56 years of age and at one time was engaged in business at Amity, and before that in Washington Territory. Suspicion points to Chiuamen as the perpetrators of the murder. The deceased was buried by the Masonic order Wednesday at Lafayette.

The public jail we find not to be cleanly kept, and it is insecure for the safe keeping of prisoners therein. We have examined into the various commitments brought before us, and made our report in relation thereto, and having finished our business as such Grand Jurors, we now ask to be discharged. R. M.
