Easily Satisfied.

An exchange retorts on a tariff organ in this manner:

A war tariff organ announces that "the Republicans are convinced of the soundness and wisdom of the policy they have pursued for the past quarter of a century" in keeping the taxes on raw materials and maintaining the duty within two points of the highest average reached during the war.

Some people are very easily satisfied. The country has witnessed during the last half of this period three of the worst financial panics ever known. It has suffered from industrial stagnation and business depression during ten of the past thirteen years. Labor troubles such as the country never knew before have grown up and become chronic during this period of high taxation. The gulf that separates the poor from the rich has broadened and deepened almost to old World dimensions. Our manufactures, handicapped by the tax enhanced cost of materials and machinery, are shut out from the markets of the world. The ratio of manufactured goods and articles to our total exports is less than it was in several of the years before "stimulation" was given to our infant industries. And as a crowning result, the prolonged war tariff is producing \$100,000,000 a year in excess of the needs of the Government.

If the Republicans are satisfied with this policy, why did they pledge the people to "correct the inequalities of the tariff and prevent the surplus?"

The Oregonian begins an article this week with the statement that the Democrats are very near obtaining control of the senate, and quotes approvingly a statement that the new Senator from California is not a Senator at all, because the California apportionment law is not legal in Senator Edmunds' opinion. No officer in California from the Supreme Court downward but recognized the validity of the California State Senate. No citizen but acknowledges it. Yet on such a flimsy pretext, by pretending to recognize men as State-creators who do not even claim to be such a Senator is to be refused his seat. In this State no apportionment was made after the census of 1882, as made mandatory by the Constitution. If the State Senate of California is unconstitutional, because the Constitution of California has been disregarded, then there is no Legislature in Oregon and Mitchell and Dolph are not Senators.

The Crown Prince of Germany is said to have remarked very recently: "My accession will be a guarantee of peace, for it will mark the end of Bismarck's reign. Count von Hatzfeldt, now ambassador in London will be made Chancellor and his mission will be to conclude a triple alliance between France, England and Germany." The Crown Prince seems to think he is a bigger man than Bismarck. He may find otherwise.

The State Board of School Land Commissioners have made a ruling that all state swamp land sold since 1878 in bodies over 320 acres to any one person was made under a misapprehension and that consequently the sales are illegal. The Governor recommends that the State shall return the money paid to the State by such parties.

Senator Dolph made a speech in the Senate recently insisting that improvement of rivers was necessary in order to give the producers cheaper freight rates. If the Senator really think so and is not humbugging for effect, why does he not reduce the rates of the road whose policy he dictates. There's the rub.

The sentence in Gov Penney's inaugural cannot be too often repeated: "The Senate of the United States today is mainly a corral of corporation lawyers placed there for the furtherance of corporate interests."

Frank Hiseock, the new Republican Senator from New York, is a poor man compared with his brother Republicans of the Senate. He is worth only \$750,000.

Judge Reagan has been elected to the United States Senate from Texas. He is a strong anti-monopolist, and will do the people good service. Needless to say, he is a Democrat.

Judge Turpie has been elected U. S. Senator from Indiana. He is a Democrat. The Republican plan of straining a seat in the Senate has ignominiously failed.

Ex-Gov Bate is the name of the new Senator from Tennessee. He is a poor man and a Democrat. Mr Bate has brains, however.

Some of the newspapers have arranged a war between the U. S. and England on the fishery question. There will be no war, and there is no cause for it. There are jingoes in both countries, in Canada and the U. S., politicians of the order of Ingalls, who would be hot for war. But we sadly suspect that these gentlemen have killing tongues and quiet swords.

Rumors of war continue to fill the European air, and every sign and portent is made to do duty for the news-mongers and the speculators. When Von Moltke is seen in the yard back of his chateau holding his sword on a grindstone and occasionally pausing to caress the edge with the thick of his thumb, it will be time for the great American people to advance the price of repeating rifles.
