### Passed by the Legislature.

#### A COMPLETE AND ACCURATE LIST OF THE NEW LAWS

During the Legislative session just ended 433 bills were introduced—183 in the Senate and 270 in the House. Of this number 117 were passed—59 by the Senate and 53 in the House. Below is a list of the bills passed during the session:

#### SENATE BILLS.

- No 3, incorporating the town of Cottage Grove; went into effect on approval.
- No 15, the Portland railroad bridge bill; passed over the governor's veto.
- No 16, amending the Prineville charter.
- No 17, providing for a health officer at Gardiner, at a salary of \$400 a year.
- No 18, Hare's swamp land bill; went into effect on approval.
- No 26, amending the Salem charter; went into effect on approval.
- Nos 54 and 55, authorizing the lease of the O R & N system to the Union Pacific; not signed by the governor, but became a law by limitation.
- No 62, Wagger, abolishing the La Grande land office.
- No 67, authorizing the Multnomah county court to build an armory; went into effect on approval.
- No 84, amending the Albany charter; went into effect on approval.
- No 89, providing for the sale of Baker City school house; went into effect on approval.
- No 90, amending the Marshfield charter.
- No 102, amending the Silverton charter; went into effect upon approval.
- No 117, amending the Astoria charter; went into effect on approval.
- No 134, amending the Hillsboro charter.
- No 135, providing that the Crook county court shall be held the first Monday in January and the first Monday in every alternate month thereafter.
- No 137, Miller, incorporating the town of Grant's Pass; goes into effect on approval by the electors of the town, to be decided at special election the first Monday in March.
- No 149, amending The Dalles charter; went into effect on approval.
- No 151, amending the Oakland charter; went into effect on approval.
- No 152, Stanley, amending the Jacksonville charter; went into effect upon approval.
- No 153, providing that the Portland city auditor shall receive no pay as clerk of the police commissioners.
- No 156, providing for time of holding circuit court in the 6th judicial district.
- No 158, authorizing a dyke across Duncan slough, Lane county, to be maintained by John Bergman, John Lawson, and others.
- No 163, amending the McMinnville charter; went into effect on approval.
- No 165, the re-appointment bill, heretofore published in full.
- No 166, creating the railroad commission; went into effect on approval.
- No 180, providing for an additional circuit judge in the sixth judicial district; went into effect on approval.

#### HOUSE BILLS.

- No 3, creating Willowa county.
- No 12, providing for the time for holding courts in the 1st Judicial District.
- No 13, providing for a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$300, or imprisonment not exceeding one year, and forfeiture of license for allowing minors in a saloon.
- No 18, to allow Yamhill county to relocate her county seat and providing for a special election on Tuesday after the first Monday in November next.
- No 19, incorporating the town of Myrtle Point, Coos county.
- No 22, incorporating Albina.
- No 26, incorporating the town of Heppner.
- No 27, increasing the salary of the Multnomah county assessor from \$2750 to \$3500, and allowing \$935 for moneys expended for clerk hire.
- No 31, incorporating the town of Joseph, Union county.
- No 33, providing that the Klamath county court shall be held the first Monday in January, March, July, September and November of each year. Also, that the judge shall receive a salary of \$500 and the treasurer \$250.
- No 52, fixing the pay of the Morrow county judge at \$600 and the county treasurer at \$300.
- No 59, authorizing school directors to lease or build school houses, or buy land for school purposes when authorized by a majority of the voters present at any school meeting.
- No 60, requiring school clerks to keep a roll of persons of school age, and to deliver the same to their successors.
- No 65, creating Malheur county.
- No 87, requiring county clerks on the 1st day of April and the 1st day of October of each year to publish in one issue of a weekly paper in the county a complete statement of the county finances; went into effect on approval.
- No 95, appropriating \$355 for relief of A. W. Presley.
- No 97, providing for times of holding county court in Gilliam county.
- No 98, authorizing a general levy of 5 mills tax for school purposes.
- No 98, requiring school clerks to make a district assessment roll within thirty days from date of tax levy.
- No 109, providing imprisonment not to exceed thirty days, or fine not to exceed \$20 for unlawfully wearing a badge or button of the U. A. R. Justices of the peace have jurisdiction.
- No 113, incorporating the town of Sellwood.
- No 123, fixing the salary of superintendent of the penitentiary at \$1500 per year.
- No 128, incorporating the town of Drain.
- No 149, for the time of holding terms of

the circuit court for the Seventh Judicial District.

No 149, defining the boundary line between Yamhill and Tillamook counties.

No 164, amending the dairy law, but not altering its main purposes or provisions.

No 166, incorporating the town of Springfield, Lane county, went into effect on approval.

No 186, defining the boundaries of Linn county.

No 190, amending the Eugene charter; went into effect on approval.

No 203, amending the East Portland charter.

No 204, abolishing the office of county clerk of Multnomah county; goes into effect the first Monday in July, 1888.

No 218, providing that the terms of the circuit court in the Second Judicial District be held as follows: Douglas, second Monday in October and first Monday in May; Curry, second Monday in June; Coos, fourth Monday in May and third Monday in September; Lane, third Monday in April and first Monday in November; Benton, fourth Monday in March and third Monday in November; went into effect on approval.

No 222, providing for per diem and mileage of members of the legislature.

No 233, amending the Arlington charter.

No 247, amending the Ashland charter.

No 248, authorizing the directors of school district No 47, Linn county, to build a school house with district money now on hand.

No 254, creating the office of county commissioner in Columbia county. Goes into effect after the next general election.

No 270, the general appropriation bill.

#### MEMORIALS AND RESOLUTIONS.

- H. J. M. No 5, praying for payment of certain specific Indian war claims to the amount of \$13,845.
- H. M. No 3, praying for the improvement of the Umpqua river.
- S. J. M. No 3, praying for the vacation of the Northern Pacific railroad grant between Wallula to Portland.
- H. J. M. No 4, praying that veterans of the Indian war of '55 and '56 be pensioned.
- S. J. R. No 5, requesting representatives in congress to secure a law preventing aliens from grazing stock on public lands.
- S. J. M. No 6, praying for the construction of a boat railway at The Dalles.
- S. J. M. No 7, praying for an appropriation of \$500,000 for improvement of the upper Columbia river.
- S. J. M. No 9, praying that suits be brought by the general government to cancel the land grant of the Willamette Valley & Cascade Mountain Road company.
- S. J. R. No 9, authorizing the superintendent of public instruction to enforce the law for teaching physiology and hygiene in the public schools.
- S. J. R. No 10, directing the secretary of state to publish the amended school laws in pamphlet form.
- S. J. M. No 10, praying for an appropriation to make a road around Cape Perpetua, Benton county.
- H. J. R. No 10, directing the secretary of state to publish the road laws in pamphlet form.
- H. J. R. No 11, directing the secretary of state to have copies of legislature journals prepared for publication.
- H. J. R. No 12, providing that all printing authorized by the legislature for any purpose whatever be done by the state printer.
- S. J. R. No 12, appropriating \$500 to enable the Oregon Pioneer society to publish certain records.
- S. J. R. No 15, authorizing the governor, in person or by proxy, to represent the state at the centennial anniversary of the framing of the federal constitution, to be held at Philadelphia, September next.
- S. J. R. No 18, praying congress to reimburse settlers on the O & C railroad land grant for excess above government price paid for lands.
- S. J. R. No 19, asking that veterans of the Cayuse war be pensioned.
- S. J. R. No 20, directing the secretary of state to send each member of the present legislature a copy of Hill's code, when the same shall have been published.
- Resolutions submitting three amendments to the state constitution—namely, prohibiting the liquor traffic, changing the time of state elections from June to November, and giving the legislature authority to regulate the salaries of state officers were adopted.
