TOURNAMENT MONEY. -- President B. S. Worsley, the president of the State firemen's association, don't propose to be prevented from holding the next tournament by the fact that Vancouver has been able to raise only \$233.50. He says: "The association goes in this time in better financial trim than at any time since its organization. We have \$466 on hand; Astoria firemen will raise \$250 between now and the date of the tournament; \$108 is promised from Eugene, \$100 from Walla Walla, \$48 from Lebanon, \$100 from McMinnville; Chief Kellogg, of Seattle, will see that the queen city of the Sound will send \$100; Oregon City will contribute \$75; Albany and Salem \$150 apiece. Here is \$1,002, and if Vancouver contributes \$400 more, which, doubtless, it will, we will go there with \$2,000 hung up to compete for."

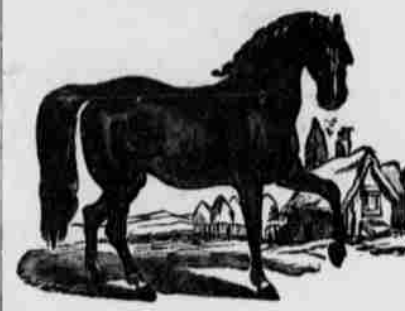
