

A Manly Letter.

S. F. Jewish Times. Following is the noble letter addressed to President Cleveland by the late Henry Ward Beecher, whose endorsement of Oscar S. Straus as a fit citizen to be our Minister to Turkey shows how true the illustrious dead was to the good name and fame of our people.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Feb. 12.—Grover Cleveland, Dear Mr. President—Some of our best citizens are solicitors for the appointment of Oscar Straus as minister to Turkey. Of his fitness, there is a general consent that he is personally and in attainments eminently excellent. But I am interested in another quality—the fact that he is a Hebrew.

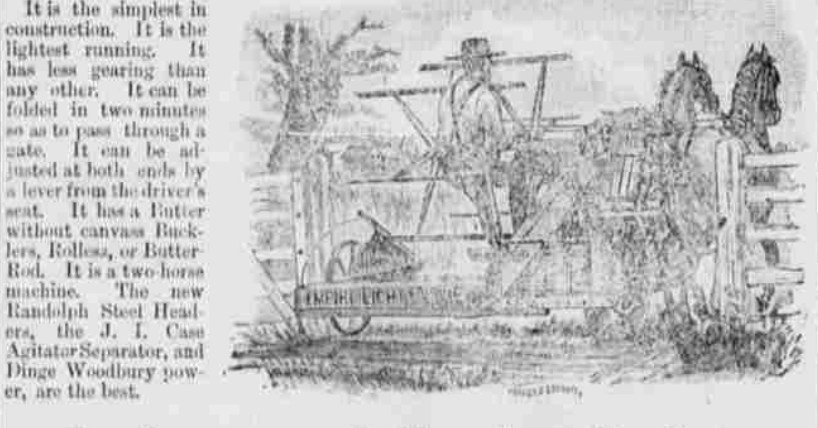
EMPIRE SENIOR MOWER.
