**Council Proceedings.**  
COUNCIL CHAMBER, EUGENE CITY,  
Or., May 9th, 1887.  
Council met pursuant to ordinance.  
Present—Mayor F B Dunn, Councilmen  
E R Luckey, J H McClung, J C Church, S  
H Friendly, G B Dorris, Recorder and Mar-  
shal.  
The minutes of April 11th and 25th were  
read and approved.  
The finance committee reported favorably  
on the following bills, and on motion war-  
rants were ordered drawn for the several  
amounts to-wit:  
R M Robinson, \$40.30; Or State Journal,  
\$5; J B Stowell, \$7; F M Wilkins, \$3.20;  
Midgley & Dysinger, \$7.35; Pritchett &  
Forkner, \$4; Robt McGhee, \$4.50; V H  
Rowland, \$2.50; H J Day, \$18.25; W S  
Shaw, \$22.05; G T Fanning, \$3.25; I L  
Campbell, \$22.10; C M Collier, \$31.50; Day  
& Pratt, \$3.50; Wid McGhee, \$2.25; Zack  
Moore, \$1.50; Calvin Hanna, \$5; J M Hen-  
dricks, \$4.  
On motion of Mr Friendly the sum of ten  
dollars per month is allowed J T Witter  
extra compensation for lighting street lamps.  
The committee on fire and water, to whom  
was referred the petition asking for the ex-  
tension of the fire limits recommended the  
prayer of petitioners be granted and on mo-  
tion the judiciary committee was instructed  
to prepare an ordinance in accordance with  
the same.  
The judiciary committee presented Ordinance  
No. 54, Amending Section 2, Title 10,  
which after consideration was adopted and  
ordered published.  
The special committee, to whom was re-  
ferred the matter of testing the water works,  
submitted the following report, which was,  
on motion, adopted and ordered to be enter-  
ed in the minutes, to-wit:  
EUGENE, May 9th, 1887.  
We, the committee on fire and water and  
on streets would report in regard to the hy-  
drants as follows:  
Your committee with the chief engineer  
tested the following hydrants with 400 feet  
of hose and 1 1/4 inch nozzle as agreed upon  
by the committee with the following result,  
with reservoir pressure:  
Hydrant on 5th and Lawrence, 46.62 ft.  
Hydrant on 11th and Pearl, 53.50 ft.  
Hydrant on 9th and High, 48.23 ft.  
Hydrant on 8th and Willamette, 60 ft.  
These figures represent the perpendicular  
height thrown. None of the hydrants came  
up to the estimate which was 65 feet.  
While the number of feet thrown was not  
up to our expectations, we regard them all as  
efficient for fire purposes, and the committee  
made the following proposition to the water  
company subject to ratification of the coun-  
cil.  
To-wit, that the city will pay \$65 each for  
eleven hydrants, the company having put in  
a twelfth one for a test hydrant, and ordered  
and proposed to place this one whether the  
city took any water or not. That the city  
will take water for fire purposes from the 12  
hydrants for one year at \$400.  
To the proposition of paying for eleven  
hydrants they dissent and claim the city  
ought to pay for the entire number. This  
the committee have had no time to consider  
and the matter is referred to the coun-  
cil.

On motion a warrant was ordered drawn  
for the sum of \$715 in favor of the water  
company.  
On motion of Mr Friendly the rules were  
suspended and a warrant ordered drawn in  
favor of Chief Engineer Day for \$10.50 for  
testing hydrants.  
On motion of Mr McClung the Recorder  
be, and he is hereby authorized, without fur-  
ther action of the council to draw a warrant  
monthly in favor of the water company, for  
the sum of \$33.33%.

The committee on streets submitted their  
reports for contracts let on street work which  
was approved and ordered on file.  
A petition from the property holders, ask-  
ing for the grading of Eleventh street, was  
read. On motion the prayer of petitioners  
was granted.  
The committee on streets presented the  
notice for the proposed grading and graveling  
of 4th, 5th, 9th and 11th streets, which was  
on motion approved and the Recorder in-  
structed to post the same as required by law.  
A petition from Mr L Adair, asking for the  
appointment of Mr Clark as a special mar-  
shal at the depot, without pay, was on mo-  
tion referred to the judiciary committee.  
On motion the request of Mr W T Camp-  
bell, to have the 9th street bridge increased  
in width, was referred to the committee on  
streets.  
On motion of Mr McClung, the street com-  
mittee was instructed to put in a street cross-  
ing on the east side of Willamette on 15th  
street.  
The following bills were read and referred  
to the finance committee: to-wit, McCornack  
& Collier, \$4.15; John Smith, \$6; I L Camp-  
bell, \$22.50; H J Day, \$9.25; Willamette  
Lumber Co., \$40.83; Robinson & Church,  
\$6.50; George Nelson, \$4; Day & Hender-  
son, \$3; Starr and Vandenburg, \$3.55; B F  
Dorris, \$29.30.  
On motion adjourned.

**SECOND-CLASS RATE.**—Beginning this  
week, a through second-class rate of \$20 per  
passenger will be charged from San Fran-  
cisco to Portland. There will be no reduction  
price to passengers stopping at Salem, Al-  
bany, Eugene, etc. Tickets at the same rate  
will also be sold from Portland to San Fran-  
cisco. It has not yet been decided whether  
or not upon the completion of the road this  
schedule will be lowered. It depends on  
whether the O & C, and C & O are operated  
as a single line or separately. It is also  
thought that the sleeping car service between  
Ashland now \$3.50 will be reduced to \$2.50.  
A buffet service of serving meals is to be in-  
augurated on the California portion of the  
line and it is to be hoped that the Oregon  
branch will imitate its example. Although  
not so complete as the dining service, this  
will be considered preferable to the hasty  
meals had at way stations.

**LEWIS COUNTY BACON TO NEW YORK.**—Jas.  
Shelton, residing in the Forks of the Santiam,  
shipped from this city yesterday to New  
York City 90 hams, weighing 1166 pounds.  
They were sent to Col. T. E. Hogg and  
Messrs Blair and Fyne, who on their trip  
last summer were pleased with Oregon hams  
and contracted with Mr Shelton for shipment,  
paying 18 cents per pound. This is prob-  
ably the first shipment of Oregon bacon to  
New York, and it shows that Oregon wheat  
fed bacon can successfully compete with  
the pork of the much boasted corn producing  
states.—Thursday's Albany Herald.

There are 123 postoffices in Oregon, Wash-  
ington and Idaho that report daily to the  
office in Portland, sending all the money re-  
ceived from the issuance of money orders  
and postal notes. These remittances aggre-  
gate about \$6,000 daily, which gives some  
idea of the extensive business done by  
Uncle Sam in the Northwest.
