

#### Memorial Day in Chicago.

Memorial Day was celebrated in Chicago in a manner that exhibited American char actor at its best advantage. The graves of the dead blue and gray veterans were strewn alike with flowers, and the occasion passed off without the slightest utterance to bitterness or reopen old wounds. Indeed, if the Chicago papers are to be believed, the occasion drew the soldiers of the Union and those who served in the Confederate Army much closer together in fraternal feeling. The following extract from an editorial in the Inter-Ocean will illustrate the spirit in which Chicago did honor to the heroic dead;

"The unique cross of Southern moss, an offering from a Southern city to ex-Confederates living in Chicago, stood for two days in the window of the Inter-Ocean office, the uncompromising Republican paper of the Northwest. This was a reminder, not of the war, but of what followed the war. The ex-Confederates went quietly to Oakwoods to decorate the graves of those who were the gray, and as they stood in seeming isolation the sudden roll of drums marked the approach of three detachments of men who still were the blue, each with a testimonial of their respect for the men who fought against them. This mingling of Southern moss and Northern flowers, this marching down of Union veterans on ex-Confederates, who now carried the same flag as themselves—these were not reminders of the war so much as

what came after the war.

There occurred yesterday a good many things to to stir the blood, to touch the heart, to turn the thoughts of old and young in the right direction. Even the ex-Confederates at Oakwoods confessed to a feeling of unwonted tenderness when the men in blue bared their heads in silent, soldierly fashion in the presence of the Confederate dead, and afterwards as the heavy columns moved through the streets, and afterward as these sair > ex-Confederates were free to say they liked to see much made of the day and what it represented. They did not regard the display as a reminder of the cruelties of war, but as a vivid illustration of what had come to the nation through war.

The Lebanon Express of Friday says: As stated some time since in this paper, the immense depth of snow on the summit of the mountains would greatly retard travel over the Santiam wagon road. On Monday last we learned from J. D. Walten that a snow we learned from J. D. Walton that a snow slide occurred prometime ago on the McKenzie grade, five miles west of Fish Lake, which will require some time to remove before teams can pass. The slide is about 250 fact wide and from 12 to 14 feet deep, composed of snow, ice, rocks and logs, and will be hard to remove. Supt. Gilliland has a force of men at work removing it, and everything will be done to hasten travel across the mountain. There are a number of teams mountain. There are a number of teams and wagons on the east side anxiously waiting to come through. It is thought that teams can get through in about ten days with the assistance of the men who are there clearing away the debris.
