The State Vagrancy Law.

Following is the new vagrancy law passed at the last session of the legislature, which went into effect on the 20th ult. We went into effect on the 20th ult. hope to see it thoroughly enforced in this

hope to see it thoroughly enforced in this county:

SECTION 1. All idle or dissolute persons who have no visible means of living or lawful occupation or employment by which to earn a living; all persons who shall be found within the state of Oregon begging the means of support in public places, or from house to house, or who shall procure a child or children so to do, all persons who shall live in or afout houses of ill-fame or ill-repute, shall be deeped vagrants; and, upon conviction there, shall be fined not less than \$50, nor more than \$250, or imprisonment in the enty jail not less than ten, nor more than 250 days, or both, in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 2. When any person is committed to the county jail under sentence of vagrancy it shall be the duty of the sheriff of said county to cause said vagrant to be employed at hard labor during eight hours of each day of said period of sentence upon any public property or works belonging to said county,

or in any work for the county.

SEC. 3. The sheriff shall have authority in his discretion to cause said vagrant to be worked upon the public streets of the town or city in which the county jail is situated after first obtaining authority frem said town

after first obtaining authority from said cown or city to do so.

SEC. 4. Is the case provided for in section 3 of this act, said sheriff shall have authority to leave said vagrant in charge of the marshal, police or other proper city officers during the hours he is worked, for the purpose of more fully carrying out the objects of this law.

SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the sheriff

SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the sheriff to have at all times an iron ball and chain seenrely fastened to the leg of said vagrants while employed at hard labor as provided in SEC. 6. Justices' courts shall have juris-

> SOMETHING NEW.—An entirely new phase of the liquor traffic has just been developed in Augusta, Maine, a prohibition state, which would say to have the effect of annulling would seem to have the effect all state prohibitory enactments. During last week Michael Burns, a well-known liquor dealer of that city, imported a large quantity of liquors from England; carted them through the streets of Augusta in daylight; opened a store and sold the whisky, rum, etc. in original packages under United States license and the state authorities are powerless to prevent it. Such are the statements contained in the dispatches, therefore. Only Congress can prohibit the sale of imported liquor in original packages even in a prohibition state. dealer of that city, imported a large quantity bition state.

Prohibition leaders claim that they wil be able to poll 50,000 votes in New York in November. This is a large claim, and though the increase in their vote in recent years has been steady, it has not been large years has been steady, it has not been large enough each year to make so great a gain as this probable. It was nearly 19,000 in 1883, nearly 25,000 in 1884, nearly 31,000 in 1885 and over 36,000 in 1886. There is a regu-lar advance of from 5,000 to 6,000 votes a year, but the present claim is for 14000 ad-
