Harper's Weekly, speaking of the Mugwumps and the president, says:
The pension votes, for which he is vehemently assailed, they think, we presume, to have been generally wise. The order for the return of the rebel flags, promptly revoked when found to be illegal, they unquestionably think to have been unwise in outrunning present public sympathy, but to have been due to a truly patriotic impulse. The refusal to expose his office to partisan insult they undoubtedly approve as a dignified, just and manly rebuke. The Mugwumps in supporting him against Mr. Blaine in '84 walked largely by faith. In supporting him against Mr. Blaine in '88 they would walk by sight. Whatever his mistakes, and however his course may have disappointed certain ardent expectations, no sagacious observer can doubt that Mr. Cleveland is much stronger with the people of the United States than he has ever been, and that the very character of the opposition to him shows that his adversaries are conscious of this fact.

The following is the soundest plank in the Maryland Democratic platform:
Resolved, That the administration of Grover Cleveland has kept the faith of the Democratic party of the Union. It has with firmness recovered millions of the public domain and protected the humblest settler from the capacity of grasping corporations, has revived respect for law, restored confidence in our institutions, and brought economy and integrity to all the functions of government. Already a navy is fast being created, of which we may feel justly proud, and the great heart of the country throbs healthfully as we gradually go back to the honest methods of the fathers of the Republic.

The career of Senator Reagan is a political romance. He was born a citizen of the U. S. but threw off his allegiance and became a citizen of the Republic of Texas, and a member of its congress. When Texas was annexed he again became a citizen of the United States and a member of congress at Washington. When Texas went into the Confederacy he went along and was a member of the Confederate Cabinet. When Texas was reconstructed he came back and is now a Senator of the United States. So, living all the time in Texas, he has held office under three different Governments, *de jure* and *de facto*.—Alta.

A Republican paper at Olympia states that Seattle which is 75 miles further north than Olympia gets the Oregonian and the Portland mail three hours before Olympia, but it carefully hides the information that a passenger to Olympia reaches there three hours later than a passenger bound to Seattle. The Olympia railroad does not make close connections, and the Republican editor of that paper waited many times along with the mail, because the railroad company makes its own time card. That scribble no doubt will be happy to learn that a great author has written a defense of lying as a political necessity.

Secretary Whitney let the contract this week for the construction of three war cruisers and two gunboats. The cruisers are required to run nineteen knots per hour and for every knot gained over this speed \$50,000 will be paid. John Roach's old tub built for the same purpose, made five different trials before it could make fourteen knots. Yet it is the faith of some people we know of that Roach was the only American ship builder, and that the Democratic party caused his death by cancer, and broke him down financially, so that he was able to leave only \$2,500,000 to his heirs.

The colored veterans of the war, reunited at Boston, adopted a resolution setting forth the duty of the government to remedy the evil of "subjection to mob violence and deprivation of the right of suffrage" of their race at the South. It is worthy of note that the colored men of the South themselves have made very little complaint lately. They know, and the colored veterans ought to know, that the negroes of the South are far better off, in all respects, than they were when the republican administration at Washington sought to "protect" them in order to sustain the thieving carpet-bag governments.—N. Y. World.

The Oregonian is attempting to prove that the civil war is not over. We have noticed that just before Presidential elections Republican editors are impressed with this belief. Republican politicians this time at least will not prophesy as they did before, that the rebel debt would be paid and so on ad infinitum. Suppose they save their wind and tell how many rebel soldiers were pensioned.

"The democratic party," says the New York Herald, "is not only the people's party, but it is the party of the whole people. It knows no north, no south and no parties for any one. It deprecates this attempt to ride to power on the backs of the skeletons of a dead past. Its policy is of the future. Therefore it claims the respect and support of the nation. It received both in 1884, and will have both in 1888."

Gov. Penoyer will start for Philadelphia shortly after September 1, to represent Oregon in the celebration of the centennial anniversary of the adoption and promulgation of the constitution of the United States. His reasonable expenses will be paid by the state, in accordance with a joint resolution passed by the last legislature.

The united labor party in New York is showing signs of a collapse. The rank and file are dropping back into old party lines, leaving the leaders sequestered and alone.

The New Orleans Picayune says "the head of the nation should wear a big hat." President Cleveland takes a 7 1/2. Is that big enough?

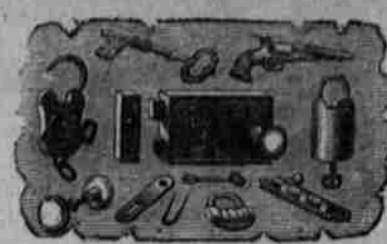

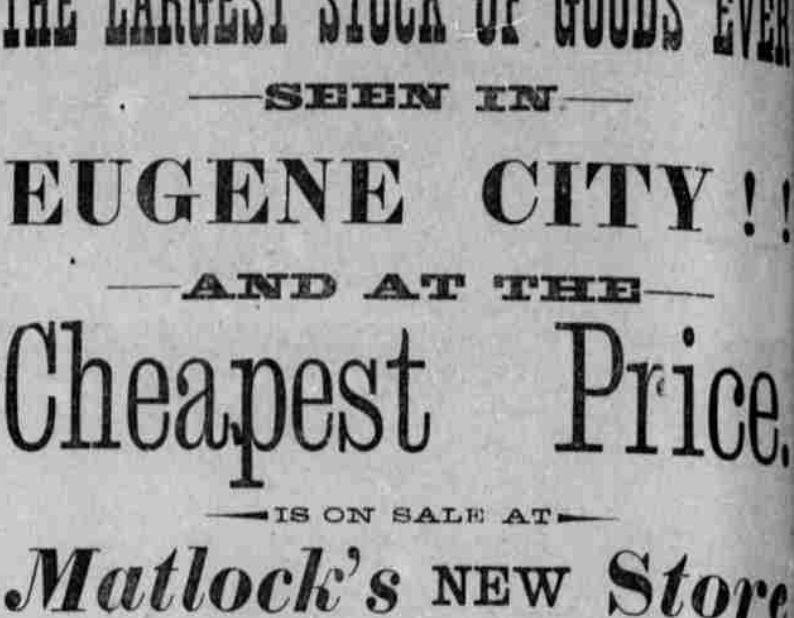
