NOTICE TO OPERITORS posed amendments to the state constitution: FIRST-PROBIBITION AMENDMENT.

SECTION 1. The manufacture, sale, or the giving away, or the offering to sell or give away, or the keeping for sale, of any spirituous, vinous, malt, distilled, fermented, or any intoxicating liquors whatever, is prohibited in this state, except for medicinal, sci-

entific, or mechanical purposes.

SECTION 2. The legislative assembly shall provide by law in what manner, by whom, and at what place such liquors, or any of them, shall be manufactored or sold, or kept for sale for medicinal, scientific, or mechanical purposes.

Section 3. This amendment shall take effect and be in full force in six months from the date of its ratification by the electors. Section 1. The legislative assembly shall without delay pass all necessary laws with sufficient penalties is cessary to enforce this amendment.

SECOND-AMENDMENT TO SALARIES OF STATE OFFICERS Article XIII.

Section 1. The governor, secretary of state, treasurer of state, judges of the su-preme court, and all other state officers of this state shall receive an annual salary of such sum as the legislative assembly shall heremafter by law for each of such officers provide; provided, that when the legislative seembly shall have by law fixed the salary of any such officer, such salary shall neither be increased nor duninished during the term

for which the incumbent of such office shall have been elected or appointed. THIRD-AMENDMENT TO TIME OF BOLDING GENERAL ELECTION.

Article II. Section 14. General elections shall be neld on Tuesday next after the first Monday n November, biennially.


