In 1788 there was one baked in commemoration of the recovery of George III; another was baked in 1815, in honor of the peace; another in 1846, in celebratten of the repeal of the corn laws, and now a pie has been baked which is described as unequaled in the annals of pie-baking. It is recorded of the last pie that it was put on a platform, which gave way, and the pie alipped to the ground; that a crowd of fifteen thousand people surged forward. A scramble ensued, and amid a wild turmoil the stage was unterly demolished and flung to the winds. Something like this, but not quite sa bad, occurred at Denby Dale. A tremendous crowd of people flocked from Bradford, Hudersheld.
