BEST LETTER.

Republican political circles have been stirred to their depths the past week by a letter from Blaine, stating that his name will not be presented for President at the next Republican convention. It is a long letter and we lack space to give it entire, but give the pertinent part which is as follows:

Florence, Italy, Jan. 25, 1888.

B. F. Jones, Chairman of the National Committee—Suz: I wish through you to state to the members of the Republican party that my name will not be presented to the national convention called to assemble in Chicago in June next for the nomination of candidates for president and vice-president of the United States. I am constrained to this decision by considerations entirely personal to myself, of which you were advised more than a year ago.

He then proceeds to figure the Republican party into power by comparing elections from 1880 to 1887. Our only surprise is that he should decline when he could demonstrate so satisfactorily to himself Republican success. He also thinks the Democratic party, or rather its representative, and next candidate for president Grover Cleveland made a mistake when he demanded and urged a reduction of the surplus that is being drawn into the treasury, by reducing the present unreasonably tariff. Bro. Blaine, however, does not as in a former letter urge the reduction of the tax on whisky and tobacco. A burnt child dreads the fire; after observing the decided effect produced by that letter he wisely profits by said experience and lets that topic severely alone.

There is also a touch of humor in the effect produced by this letter. Blaine's enemies in his own party, and his competitors for the nomination seem to be convinced that this settles the matter so far as he is concerned, while his friends and partisans read between the lines and see only a renewed effort to strengthen himself and win the coveted prize. If Blaine really wished to decline he should have read the letter of a great statesman, Samuel J. Tilden, addressed to the Democratic convention of 1880. If he had read and profited by it no question would have been raised as to the true meaning of his letter.

Some of the Republicans, who are of Eugene seriously shook their heads and whispered dreadful things to each other this week just because Gov. Whipple made a business trip to Eugene, as may be seen from the advertising columns of the *times*. The Lane county Democracy is able to select a county ticket that will win in June, without outside influence. Take notice of this and save yourself sleepless nights caused by the presence of this or that prominent Democrat.

The Oregonian is engaged in the pleasant work of nominating and electing Gen. Phil Sheridan to the Presidency. We advise our great journalistic brother to bide by the military candidates. The war caused nearly a quarter of a century ago. In 1880 the Democratic party had a military candidate. Goes up like a rocket and comes down like a stick, is the most concise way to express the result.

The poor little tax that the American people howled about when the tea was thrown overboard in Boston harbor looks trivial enough in these days, when one of the two great American political parties lives only to keep up and increase taxation, and expects to get into power once more because it is that kind of an organization.—*Courier Journal*.

Last year \$3,000,000 pounds of third class carpet wools were imported into this country. Hardly any of that grade of wool is grown in the United States. A tax of over \$1,000,000 was collected from it. Who paid the tax? Whoever bought a yard of carpet during the year paid four cents a yard by way of tax more than was necessary.

John Osterh, who was appointed by Gov. Penruer, delegate from Oregon to the Farmers' National Agricultural Congress, and who was elected a vice-president for that body, has called a meeting of farmers of Oregon at Salem, on the 13th of March next, for the purpose of organizing a State Farmers' Association.

When Blaine wrote his letter from Florence, Italy, to his friends in regard to his candidacy for the Presidency, he made an important omission. He should have added as a postscript, "Burn this letter."

The Democratic National Committee will meet next Wednesday in Washington City, for the purpose of choosing the time and place of holding the next National Convention.

The railroad commissioners have sent the following letter to Charles N. Scott, receiver of the Oregon Railway Company, Portland, Oregon:

"Sir: Complaint having been made to the Board of Railroad Commissioners for Oregon that the line of the Oregon Railway Company's road between Roseburg and Coburg was in a dangerous condition, the commissioners have made an examination of the line of road from Woodburn to Coburg, and find the same in a very bad condition. The ties throughout have become very rotten, in many places already broken, and, with the exception of those recently renewed, need to be replaced throughout. And while the commissioners did not fail to note that the most urgent repairs were being made along the line, it fails to note that these repairs be expedited with all possible dispatch. It properly done, with reliable virtue, whether heroic or humankind, there is nothing more absolutely certain than the fatal protection of the individual from the fatal effects of smallpox.
