The Democratic county convention of Lane met at the court house Friday of last week and placed an excellent ticket in nomination for the contest in June. For SENATOR E. P. Coleman was renominated by acclamation. Mr. E. P. Coleman has served four years in the state senate and earned the reputation among his associates of being an earnest, energetic member, outspoken and fearless in legislative work, opposed to jobs and working solely for the interests of the people. No man in Lane county is more capable of representing and protecting our interest than E. P. Coleman.

REPRESENTATIVES

C. K. Hale, D. R. Harris and Geo. A. Dorris were nominated. Mr. Hale represented Lane Co in the last legislature with credit to himself and for the best interests of our people. Mr. Harris is a farmer residing in Cottage Grove precinct, is thoroughly honest and conservative and will make a good member. Mr. Dorris is a young lawyer who by his attention to his profession has gained a fair practice. He will make an excellent canvasser and do much towards convincing the people of Lane county the entire Democratic legislative ticket should be elected. Chas. Huffman was renominated by acclamation. He has filled the office of assessor for the past term and has given general satisfaction. The county has been fairly assessed and the duties of the office well attended to by him. His re-election is assured. For

SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The present incumbent A. W. Patterson was renominated. He has filled the office acceptably and will be re-elected. He has many personal friends who will stay with him on election day. For

SURVEYOR

L. F. Wooley, of Cottage Grove, was placed in nomination. Mr. Wooley is a competent and careful surveyor and the work of the office will be faithfully performed by him. For

CORONER

Dr. A. W. Prather was renominated. It will devolve upon him to hold an inquest over the Republican party next June and determine what caused its melancholy death.

The Democrats of this second judicial district did wisely when they re-nominated Jas. W. Hamilton for prosecuting attorney. During his administration of the office criminals have found it hard to escape the meshes of the law. Although the district is several hundred miles long it was only after hard work that a man was found who would accept the nomination against Mr. Hamilton. W. S. Hufford, of Newport, is the Republican nominee, and it is needless to inform the readers of the GUARD that far at least the ensuing two years the office of district attorney will cause him no trouble.

We have been informed by good authority that S. B. Eakin, Republican candidate for state senator, pledged himself before the election in 1882 not to vote for John H. Mitchell for United States senator. His name stands on the record as voting for Mitchell.

S. B. Eakin, Jr., is a candidate for state senator, also in the banking business. Would he, if elected, favor the reduction of interest? The farmers would like to hear from him on this subject.

John M. Gearin.

John M. Gearin, of Multnomah county, was born in Umatilla county in 1851 and was educated in Notre Dame, Ind. He studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1874 and was elected to the Lower House of the legislature the same year from Multnomah county, overcoming the strong Republican majority of that county. In 1878, the Democrats nominated him for prosecuting attorney for that district and he carried Multnomah county by 150 majority when before and since it has given a Republican majority of 1500. In 1884, he was nominated again for the same office and triumphed over Mr. Tannor. He is a naturally elected lawyer and does not carry the state in the coming election, the Democrats will have but very little show to carry it for years to come. Mr. Gearin is an able orator and his personal friends are very enthusiastic. With Gearin on the ticket the Democrats have a splendid chance to overcome the Republican majority in the state.

A Statesman Made by Talk.

We have known S. B. Eakin for a long time, and know him to be a good man, but never until the last Republican convention, when several speeches were made endorsing his nomination, did we know of his prominent statesmanlike qualities. The van of this terrific onslaught on the English language and grammar was led by the fiery and doughty Colonel of Junction, while the rear was cautiously and guardedly brought up by the cool, dignified and impressive statesman from Iowa. Mr. Eakin missed the grand opportunity of his life by not being present on that gala occasion. We have the House Journal of 1882, the session of the legislature which Mr. Eakin attended, and after laborious research through its many pages find that Mr. Eakin's record consists almost solely of futile and aimless words for United States senator. "Some are born great, some achieve greatness, and some have greatness thrust upon them."

John Burnett.

The Democratic state convention nominated Hon. John Burnett for Supreme Judge. Mr. Burnett is well and favorably known in the second judicial district over which he presided as circuit judge for six years, at the same time serving on the bench of the supreme court. Among the legal profession Judge Burnett is recognized as an able and learned jurist, devoted to the honorable practice of his profession. He would fill that responsible position with dignity and ability.

The Rochester Herald requests the noise to cease while it remarks: "The Republican ticket must get more than the party vote to carry New York this year. Therefore let us scratch and bite each other less and look for votes." Mr. Hepburn, of Iowa, then comes to bat observing: "Our party is not as strong in Iowa as it was. But there is great comfort in the thought that harmony is better than numbers, and as we have less Republicans we also have less discord."

We would ask Mr. Joel Ware to explain how it is that he files the memoranda blanks used by the assessor, which are not official papers, but the assessor's private memoranda. Of course, it is a soft job for Mr. Ware to make Lane county pay him three or four hundred dollars for a couple of days' work that is entirely unauthorized. The taxpayers who are loaded this year with a high rate of taxation would like an investigation of the county and the methods by which the indebtedness has been incurred.

When any one of these high tariff men approaches you with the cry of "paper labor," "low wages," etc., just ask him what proportion of these high tariff men in congress voted to exclude Chinese immigrants. Every one, with six exceptions, voted for unlimited Chinese immigration, while but a single Democrat voted for it, and he had been a Republican, was then and is now a protectionist.—Cross Bay News.

To the persistent efforts of Senator Coleman, assisted by Senator Vestch, Lane county is represented by two senators in stead of one, as the apportionment bill first provided. His manly straightforward manner made him many friends among both political parties in the Senate, and gives him an opportunity to work for the good of Lane county far superior to any new man.

Linn county with greater population and wealth than Lane changes her county clerk every two years and yet we have not heard anything about that county going wrong. In fact she is far better off than our county. Her tax this year is but twelve mills while in Lane it is seventeen and one-half, the county paying interest on a large sum of money, and an enormous delinquent tax list outstanding.

If speechmaking in nominating candidates elected a ticket the Democrats have no show this time. At the Republican convention Saturday all kinds of speeches were made from the multitudes to create some enthusiasm. The convention even seemed to realize Joel Ware's danger of defeat; and it required a speech to make his nomination.

The Oregonian says that General Black draws a pension of \$5,000 per year. Why not say \$50,000? It would not be much further from the truth. General Black has a special pension of \$1200 a year, voted to him by Congress, for the most serious wound any soldier survived, and Republicans seem never to get done grudging it to him.—S. F. Alta.

County Clerk Ware is generally supposed to know all about land matters and when it comes to making final proofs to be very liberal in the matter. However, we have it from reliable authority that his charges for fees in making final proof, in more than one instance, exceeded fees charged by the Register at Roseburg by several dollars.

The Albany Democrat states that the Republicans of Salem threatened to rotten egg St. John, and that there was similar talk in Albany. The Grand Old Party is not driven head when it proposes such measures. Free speech will win and no party can afford to curtail it.

Ex Senator Conkling died at his rooms in New York City Wednesday morning at 1:30 o'clock. He had passed the greater part of his manhood in Congress, from which he emerged with a stainless reputation. His name was never connected with the scandals that clouded the names of so many of our public men during the war period and for some time thereafter. He was proud, aristocratic, and unyielding in his discharge of public duties, faithful to his friends, and relentless to his enemies. His funeral took place Friday.

In Louisiana the regular Democratic ticket was elected, notwithstanding a party fight, by about 20,000 majority.
