VERY GREAT CITIES.

Those Whose Population Exceeds One Million are as follows:

Cities with 1,000,000 inhabitants and upward have never been plentiful in any age of the world, and their number is very limited now. There are four such cities in Europe, three or four in Asia, and but one on this continent.

The number in regard to the fact that it is difficult to determine either the claim of Nanking to 1,000,000 inhabitants is correct or not. Assuming it, however, to be just, the rank of the very great cities of the world, based on the censuses of 1850 and 1881, would stand as follows:

London, 4,766,351; Paris, 2,269,023; Canton, 1,600,000; New York, 1,203,591; Tokio, 1,140,586; Berlin, 1,122,351; Vienna, 1,103,857; Peking, 1,000,000; Nanking, 1,000,000.

The round numbers given as representing the population of the three Chinese cities named have a very suspicious look, and perhaps they ought to be thrown out of the account entirely.

Certainly, Chinese or Japanese estimates or partial enumerations are not to be placed beside a properly taken census. A singular illustration of the folly of estimates was furnished by the case of Tokio, which was once believed to be the most populous city in the world, and to have 4,000,000 inhabitants.

When a census came to be taken the population of the city was found to be as stated above, and this number includes the suburbs. The population of the city proper was but 811,510.

In the figures given for Vienna, the suburbs are also included. As London is not a city, in the proper sense of the term, but an aggregation of municipalities, the population given is that of the metropolitan and city police districts which cover a very large area, about 26 square miles.

A similar area about New York would take in all Kings County, half of Queens, Westchester and Richmond Counties, as well as Jersey City, Newark, and numerous small towns in New Jersey, with an aggregate population at the last census of at least 2,250,000, and, of course, a much larger population now.

FOREIGN GOSSIP.

—Before the century is out it is estimated that London will have a population of 7,000,000.

—The Celtic language is spoken by nearly 940,000 people in Ireland, 64,000 of whom can speak no other.

—In the agricultural districts around the city of Zacatecas a laborer gets \$7 cents daily. The hours of labor are from sunrise to sunset.

—Chili is likely to prove an important source of borax. Analyses made by Chilean and English chemists indicate that the crude borax of that country can probably be made to yield as good a product as the borax of California.

—The extraordinary supply of grouse in London on the first day of the shooting law was up is now accounted for by the information that the grouse had been kept for ten months in ice cellars at a temperature of 28 deg. They were very much relished.

—The recent discovery of several valuable springs of different mineral waters in Costa Rica has caused the government to issue a decree declaring all such to be the property of the State, and ordering that in future none shall be transferred to private ownership.

—Young men clad in the garments formerly worn by students have been numerous in the streets of Osaka, Japan, lately. They lecture in on-off-the-way corners, and even in crowded streets when no constables are at hand, upon political subjects, and frequently urge the doctrine that "official salaries are the life-blood of the people."

—An old Prussian law provides for the annual distribution of prizes amounting to fifteen and twenty marks to such physicians and sanitary officials as shall have attempted, whether successfully or not, the resuscitation of apparently dead persons. In the last four years eighty-five such prizes were awarded, the number of those cases in which the attempted resuscitation was successful being twenty-six.

—The desert of Sahara is slowly becoming inhabitable with the aid of science. The lower Sahara is an immense basin of artesian waters, and the French are forming fresh oases with skill and success, so that the number of cultivated tracts is increasing rapidly.

After a period of thirty years, forty-three oases have 13,000 inhabitants, 123,000 trees between one and seven years old, and 100,000 fruit trees.

—The Prussian army list for 1887 contains 2 field marshals, the Crown Prince and Count Moltke, 59 cavalry and infantry generals, 76 lieutenant-generals and 117 major-generals.

The cavalry staff consists of 55 colonels, 38 lieutenant-colonels and 206 majors, and in the infantry staff there are 161 colonels, 172 lieutenant-colonels and 700 majors. The number of officers shows an increase of 66 as compared with last year.

—A mud devil is a new addition to the Philadelphia Zoological Garden. It is much like a tadpole, is about eighteen inches in length, with a broad, flat head, and has a sharp, saw-like fin running from the middle of the back to the tail.

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—Marion Hartrant, a New York girl, who is the possessor of a head of fiery red hair, has applied for an injunction to restrain a publisher from printing or selling a song sheet entitled, "Red-Headed Girl and White-robe Songster."
