The grain bag trade on the Pacific Coast last year amounted to 33,000,000 bags, and indications are that 2,000,000 more will be indications are that 2,000,000 more will be required for the wheat crop this season. The prospects for a large wheat crop was never better. The entire bag capacity of the California Jute Mill company is about 1,250,000 per year, and not more than this number can be produced by the double shift prison force at San Quentin. The great bulk of these goods, or over 30,000,000 bags, comes to the coast from Calcutta. They are filled with grain and shipped to Liverpool, and from there are returned to New York as second hand bags, which can never again be used for wheat, but are used for bagging vegetables and mill offals.


