The Land Laws.

Unmarried women, widows, maidens and deserted wives, who are over twenty-one years, are entitled to all the rights, privileges and benefits under the homestead laws that can be enjoyed by men.

The mother of a living child, or children, whether widow, deserted wife or unfortunate single person, may acquire title to land as the head of a family, though under the age of twenty-one.

Widows of deceased entrymen succeed to the rights of their husbands, and may make final proof and take title in their own names. It is not absolutely necessary that they should reside upon the land after the death of the husband, as residence or cultivation for the prescribed time is all that is required of widows and minor heirs.

The widow of a person who served ninety days or more during the war of the rebellion in the United States army, navy, or marine corps, and died without making an entry, may make an entry the same as her husband if living, might do; and in making final proof receive credit in lieu of residence on the land for the period of her husband's service, not to exceed four years.

The deserted wife of a homestead entryman may make final proof as his agent, and have patents issued in the name of her husband, or she may contest his entry on the ground of abandonment of the claim, and after cancellation enter the land in her own name. The latter is the wiser course for many reasons.

An unmarried woman, widow or otherwise, having inherited an entry, may marry, without affecting her rights to the land, provided she complies with the legal requirements. Should she marry prior to the time when she might make her proof, and perfect her claim, and leave the land to reside with her husband elsewhere, the entry would be liable to cancellation for abandonment, but not on account of the marriage.

Where a man and a woman each make a homestead entry and marry before making final proof, one of the entries must be relinquished or commuted at their choice. If they live together on one homestead, the entry covering the other homestead will be liable to contest for abandonment, even though the land be cultivated and improved. The homestead law requires three things to give final title: first, honest residence, second, good cultivation, to crops or otherwise, and third, fair improvements in the matter of buildings, fences and the like. Compliances with only one or two of these requirements will not satisfy the law. Full compliances with all three requirements must be satisfactorily shown for the entire period of the date when final proof is made.

The daughter of a deceased soldier, sailor or marine, if otherwise qualified, may enter land in her own right, notwithstanding an entry may have been made by her guardian and perfected for her benefit during her minority. She can thereby secure two homesteads.

A widow, as the legal representative of her deceased husband may continue to cultivate his homestead and at the same time make an entry in her own name. A woman has this advantage over a man. She can thus secure two homesteads while he is allowed only one.

The widow of a deceased entryman may purchase under the act of June 15, 1880, the land embraced in cases where that act is applicable.

The Height of Mt. Hood.

The Aneroid barometer which the illumination party took to the summit of Mt. Hood indicated an altitude of 13,925 feet. Mr. W. G. Steel, who was with the party, thinks this number too much by about 500 feet, his estimate of the height not exceeding 12,500 feet. However, it revives an old time belief that Mt. Hood is higher than the government figures make it, 11,255 feet, and in a measure sustains the views of those who have held out for a higher altitude.

Until some years ago, Mt. Hood was generally believed to be about 14,000 feet high. Lieut. Williamson cut the figures down to their present size by his triangulation of the height. Mr. Steel says the height of Mt. Hood will never be definitely set until an actual measurement is taken and the height triangulated. The best plan to do this, he thinks, would be for the state to co-operate with the United States geological survey. Co-operation with the government survey is quite common in other States.

Oregonian, June 23: G. W. Hunt returned yesterday from Albany, where he made arrangements for shipping to Wallula the stores and powder, tools, etc., which have been brought in from the scene of his contract on the Oregon Pacific. He says some of his powder is spoiled, and of course, all the potatoes, onions and such like stuff is worthless. When he looked over the supplies brought in and thought of all the money it had cost and the money and time wasted in hauling it out into the mountains and back again, he was a little wrothy. He expresses his opinion free in regard to the people who will lead a man into such a scrape by representing themselves to have money which they have not.

MILITARY CENSUS.—Last year a census of "all able bodied male citizens" between 18 and 45 years of age not otherwise exempted by law" was taken by law, and here is the result of it: Jackson, 1295; Wallawa, 692; Wasco, 1126; Yamhill, 1543; Douglas, 1484; Linn, 2029; Grant, 1273; Malheur, 189; Union, 1222; Multnomah, 4896; Clatsop, 871; Baker, 755; Columbia, 520; Tillamook, 397; Crook, 545; Curry, 255; Morrow, 739; Coos, 932; Josephine, 465; Gilliam, 586; Washington, 1423; Lake, 626; Marion, 341; Lane, 1739; Benton, 885; Klamath, 1852; Umatilla, 1593; Polk 1169; Clackamas, 120. Total, 33,265. As the total vote at the late election was 60,267, it would look as if a great many men were missed.

The principal sawmills of Oregon formed a "combinate" last year to keep up prices. It leaks out that the dealers in saws and doors in Portland have formed a similar association, and if any member is caught in the act of violating its terms, he is to pay a forfeit of \$300. Lumber sells at \$3.50 per M less in Melbourne than in San Francisco. In such ways the farmers and workmen are plundered. There is a tariff of \$2 per M on foreign lumber to assist the plundering.—Wolcome.
