#### The Junction Extension.

The Oregonian in an article headed "railroads," says: As yet the Southern Pacific Railroad Company has done nothing toward building the extension southward from Corvallis to Junction. For some years the project has from time to time been considered. for d until a more convenient season. There to attend College. has been no grading on the line, although some bridges and trestle were built some time since. The total distance is only about one. Southward from Corvallis a very fer tile region stretches, covered with finely cultivated farms, and is one of the best grain producing sections in the state. The proposed extension will tap this splendid portion of the Williamette valley. Within a faw years it is very probable that trains will be running regularly between Corvallis and Junction, and that branch will become part of the great system now owned and operated by that corporation in Oregon. The total cost of constructing the branch would not be

#### School Fund Apportionment.

The school fund apportionment for 1888, just made by the school land board through State Treasurer Webb, disburses to every person of school age in Oregon the sum of \$1.25, the largest amount per capita ever de-voted to this purpose. The total enumeration of persons of school age in Oregon is 86.574, and the gross amount of the apporhildren in 1886 was 81,854, and the amount the hall. disbursed was 30 cents per capita, aggregating \$74,455,30. In 1887 the census was 87, 217, and the apportionment had increased to \$1 each. The enumeration of school population has decreased in 1888 for the reason that the last legislature passed a law which requires school clerks to certify on oath as to their census of children in their districts. Heretofore the clerks' returns have been carelessly made, each making it his object to obtain as large an amount of state school money as possible. The money will be sent out to the various counties this week. Lane has 4,349 persons of school age, and will receive \$5,436.25.

### The Repairs Will Now be Made.

Judge Deady Monday modified his order of June 15th, in the case of C. N. Scott, receiver of the narrow gauge roads, vs. the Oregon Railway & Navigation Co., allowing Seott to borrow money to repair the ad and pay off indebtedness. It has been found impracticable to make the loan re- vest has commenced. quired and the modified order allows persons having claims against the marrow guage amounting to \$1,000 or more to take receiv er's certificate for their clams. Several persons may assign their claims to make up the \$1,000 when a certificate will be issued to the assignoe. These certificates are the same as a mortgage on the roads and bears interest at 9 per cent, and if the interest is not paid the interest coupon also draws interest from the time it is due. Several persons are ready to by ties, repair bridges, trestles, etc., and take certificates in payment. This scheme will probably prove satisfactory to those who hold claims against the roads on which they have heretofore not been able to realize anything.
