### The Protected Trusts.

Mr. Blaine's example is beginning to have  
its effect. Already the managers of the Re-  
publican party are attempting to swing the  
organization away from the Chicago plat-  
form to the new doctrine of non-interference  
with trusts. The Chicago Convention de-  
manded that Congress take action to sup-  
press those lawless combinations. Mr.  
Blaine says that Congress has nothing to do  
with them, and that the question of trusts  
"should have no place in a national cam-  
paign." Mr. De Young, the leader of the  
party on the Pacific Coast, has given the  
word through his paper that Mr. Blaine's  
view, and not that of the Chicago platform,  
is the one to be maintained in the local con-  
text.

And now, what are these trusts, which the  
guiding spirits of the Republican party say  
should be subjected to no control but that of  
the State Legislatures—that is to say, to no  
control at all? They are conspiracies to  
raise prices and depress wages. They rob  
consumers and workmen at once.  
Their operations follow a well-established  
plan. First there is a limitation of produc-  
tion. Factories are shut down, or run on  
half time. This throws a number of men  
out of work and makes the situations of the  
rest precarious. Employment becomes a  
favor, which must be accepted on the terms  
of the masters, or not at all. Then wages  
are reduced, and if the workmen do not like  
the change they have the privilege of giving  
up their places to some of the starving  
crowd waiting outside.

Meanwhile there is a scarcity of the pro-  
duct in the market. Consumers are clamor-  
ing for an article that only the trust can  
supply. The price goes up as wages go  
down. The trust gathers in profits with  
both hands. It robs Peter, but not to pay  
Paul. Paul as well as Peter—the workman  
as well as the consumer—pay tribute to  
its insatiable rapacity.  
Now, what connection has this iniquity  
with the tariff? A very clear and unmis-  
takable one. The tariff reduces the territory  
which the trusts must cover to managable  
proportions. Without the shield of "pro-  
tection to American industry" every such  
combination would be compelled to face the  
competition of the whole world. With that  
shield, it is safe if it can win over or crush  
out its rivals in the United States.—S. F.  
Examiner.

### The Difference.

Mr. Blaine's heedless assertion that "Eng-  
land is plastered all over with Trusts" has  
been refuted by the Times' London corre-  
spondent upon authority so competent that  
no one has ventured to challenge it. There  
are a few trade combinations in England, as  
there are everywhere, but the great Trusts  
of this country have no parallel there.  
The reason is obvious, and the World sug-  
gested it on the day after Mr. Blaine's re-  
markable deliverance.

To make a Trust permanently successful  
it must be able to control the market for the  
commodity which it handles. The organi-  
zers of most of the American Trusts are en-  
abled to do this through a tariff that shuts  
out foreign competition. The Sugar Trust  
is protected by a duty of 87 per cent, the  
Lead Trust by a duty of 60, the Rubber  
Trust by a duty of 25, the Lins and Oil Trust  
by a duty of 54. And so on to the end. The  
Standard Oil Trust is protected by its mon-  
opoly of crude petroleum. A few other  
Trusts depend upon natural advan-  
tages, but the great bulk of them are promoted  
and protected by the tariff.  
In England there is no such artificial help.  
If a combination were formed to put up  
the price of British products, France, Germany  
and the United States would at once send in  
good enough to break it down.  
The tariff is the parent of Trusts.—N. Y.  
World.

"I have just come to town from Pennsylv-  
ania," said a young, vigorous, quite well  
dressed and well satisfied looking young man  
to a Tacoma newspaper man the other day.  
I have traveled 3,000 miles and not even  
paid third class fare on much of the way; in  
fact, I have made a very cheap trip." "How  
did you manage it?" was asked. "I stood  
in with the brakeman on freight trains. It  
is not an original plan by any means. In  
fact, one brakeman told me it was no un-  
usual thing for him to make as high as \$60 a  
trip. They put such travelers as I in a box  
car, collect from him what he can pay, and  
back him up for a trip. The last jump I  
made was from Yakima to this city, and for  
that I paid \$1.50. Their were nineteen  
others in the car with me; all of us paid the  
freight brakeman or conductor the same  
amount. The train stopped first out here on  
the flats this side of the reservation, and  
the car was unlocked and we were told to  
climb out and walk into town. There are  
hundreds of men coming out here in the  
same way every week from the East.
