**Wool for the Eyes.**  
[N. Y. World.]  
Mr Blaine pretends to be horrified at the suggestion of putting wool on the free list. Ex-Congressman Converse says the blip of the Mills bill will soon be heard no more if the wool is put on the free list. The protection organs cry out that the woolen mills will all stop if the raw material is not taxed!

This is all wool for the voters' eyes.  
The United States had no tariff on wool for twenty-five years after the adoption of the constitution. The flocks increased and the price of wool was higher than it is now. In 1867 the highest tariff ever known was placed on wool. In two years the farmers were killing sheep for their pelts and tallow. Free-trade England maintains on high-priced lands 3,000,000 sheep, against 44,000,000 in this vast country with its cheap pasturage. In the free-trade Australian colony of New South Wales the number of sheep increased 12,500,000 in twelve years, while in the adjacent protectionist colony of Victoria they decreased 1,000,000.

The United States is the only manufacturing country that taxes wool. In all the rest wool growing is relatively greater and more profitable than it is here.  
"Cheaper wool, cheaper woollens, larger markets, more product, greater employment, larger pay."  
This is the sum of the whole matter.

**Ex-Secretary McCulloch Supports Cleveland.**

WASHINGTON, October 8.—Hon. Hugh McCulloch has come out for Cleveland and Thurman. He was a tariff reformer when he was Secretary of the Treasury under Lincoln, Johnson and Arthur, and he refused to change his views under the crack of the party whip.  
He regards the position of President Cleveland and the Democratic party as most nearly in accord with his views, and he therefore authorizes the statement that if he be able to get to the polls on November 6th he will vote for the Cleveland electors.  
This information is not in the nature of a surprise to those who have known Mr. McCulloch's opinions and the honesty with which he has held to them. His public declaration, however, serves to emphasize anew the distance which the Republican organization has drifted under the stress of small politics from the position of its great leaders of the war and the reconstruction periods.

State superintendent E. B. McElroy is now engaged in the work of preparing a school teacher's register, which will conform to the blanks and public school system of the state, the use of which will be made obligatory in every school district in Oregon. He has also placed in the hands of the state printer the copy for a compendium of information to the county superintendents, giving them information in regard to the keeping of the county Superintendent's register issued from that office last spring, and other instructions of a useful character.

A. B. Findley, a farmer on the Imanaha, in Walla Walla county, has succeeded in raising a monster squash, weighing 183 pounds. He took it to the town of Joseph for exhibition, and no sooner had it arrived there than it was made the subject of a political bet. If Cleveland is elected a prominent business man of Joseph has agreed to sell the squash to Enterprising, a distance of several miles; and in case Harrison is elected Charles Allman has agreed to do the same thing.

George Gustin, who has several men employed in fishing in the vicinity of Tacoma, reports to the Oregonian that a day or two since when he was over there at one haul of one of his nets six tons of sea trout, as they are called, were caught. People who came along were given all they wanted and Mr. Gustin salted a lot and still many were wasted, although the lead line was lifted and many allowed to escape. It is the general opinion that these so called trout are young salmon.

After January 1st, any paper in New York publishing the details of an execution, will be subject to a fine and imprisonment under a new law. But the managing editors of the Herald, Times, Sun, World, Star, Press and Morning Journal say they will not obey it, but will continue to publish whatever they can get concerning executions as of everything else.
