Free Whisky and Untaxed Tobacco.

From the Daily Oregonian, Nov. 27, 1882.

Simultaneously in many quarters since the elections the discovery has been made by many wisecracks that the country is oppressively taxed and that the recent verdict of the people at the ballot box is a judgment against the internal revenue system. Since there is little left of the internal revenue system but the taxes on liquors and tobacco, it must follow therefore that the people have risen in all the might of their righteous wrath to demand political and moral reform through the agency of free whisky and untaxed tobacco, and that the new millennium is to be ushered in by relieving the people of the "oppressions" they endure through governmental interference with the sacred rights of each individual to consume those "necessaries" without paying taxes, though everything else be loaded with all the taxation it will bear. We can't get sugar, nor salt, nor coal, nor shirts, nor blankets, nor shoes, nor tools without paying taxes on the same, either directly or indirectly, but what of that? These are things people can do without.

But we take leave to question the genuineness of this alleged moral uprising in favor of free whisky and tobacco. The allegation is merely a device of the extreme protectionists to prevent any interference with the great profits which the present tariff secures to them. The taxes on whisky and tobacco are not a burden on anybody. Repeat them, and the manufacturers will only make so much the more out of a business which now gives them immense profits. Repeat them, and the price of the articles will not be reduced to consumers; or, if repeal should reduce the price, it would only increase consumption, and thereby do so much the more harm.

Heavy Registration.

New York City registration shows a great increase of voters. The Star says of the second day's registration:

The registration yesterday showed a heavy increase over the second day of registration in 1884, as it did the first day of the present year over the first day four years ago.

The total number of voters who registered yesterday exceeded by over 13,000 the number registered on the corresponding day in 1884, which, with the increase of 20,000 on the first day, makes a total of more than 33,000 increase for the two days.

This means an excessively heavy registration for the year. Judging by the rate of increase to date, the total will probably reach the enormous figure of 270,000, which will insure the casting of about a quarter of a million ballots in this city on election day.

Democrats were jubilant last night, and in all quarters it was fully predicted that the increased registration meant a sweeping victory for Cleveland, Thurman and Hill. Republicans tried to be cheerful, too, but their efforts were failures. The news of the increase was not at all welcome to them, as for them it could only mean defeat.

Needless Taxes.

Two-third of the war debt is liquidated, but the machinery for employing the tax gatherer is still in operation. The carpet bagger had to relinquish his occupation, but the monopolist is as busy as ever to gather in the shekels which the war tariff, now called protection tariff, and dwelled upon as a blessing—of course, in thin disguise—affords them. But an honest, courageous President shows the iniquity of collecting taxes which are no longer needed.

Many manufacturers in the east are seeking to intimidate their employes by delivering to them on Saturday evening their pay for the week contained in envelopes on which is printed threats of lower wages or discharge if Cleveland is re-elected. At Bridgeport, Conn., a workman gave a Democratic speaker his envelope in which he had received the meager sum of \$4.46 for a week's work. The speaker made use of it, and the next day the laborer was discharged.
