Tariff Reform Republicans.

The Work of Only Six Men.

On the 11th of October, six Republican members of Armstrong Lodge, K. of L., of Indianapolis, met, and without a quorum, adopted resolutions endorsing Harrison's labor record and denouncing the 12 members of that organization as lars, who swore that Harrison said a dollar a day was enough for a laboring man, and that if he was Governor of Indiana, he would wade in blood to his finger tips unless the strikers went back to work.

The Democratic Business Men's Association of New York City numbers 73,000 members. All Democratic organizations have placed the conduct of the election in their hands, and 1700 merchants will be at the polls to run things.

That Beautiful Tariff.

Prof. Perry, who for thirty years, has occupied the chair of Political Economy in Williams College, Mass., and whose works are used as text books in many of the leading universities, in a speech at Detroit recently, calling attention to many incongruities of the tariff system, said:

"The Calumet and Hecla company, who own the richest copper deposits in Michigan, are selling their protected ores in foreign markets cheaper than they will sell them to American consumers, and within two months they have sold to British customers 10,000,000 pounds of copper at nearly 2 cents per pound less than the lowest American price for the same ore."

The workmen must remain idle three months in the year unless we can sell shoes in foreign markets. The principal shoemaker of Massachusetts recently exhibited shoes to the legislature of that state, some home-made and some foreign.

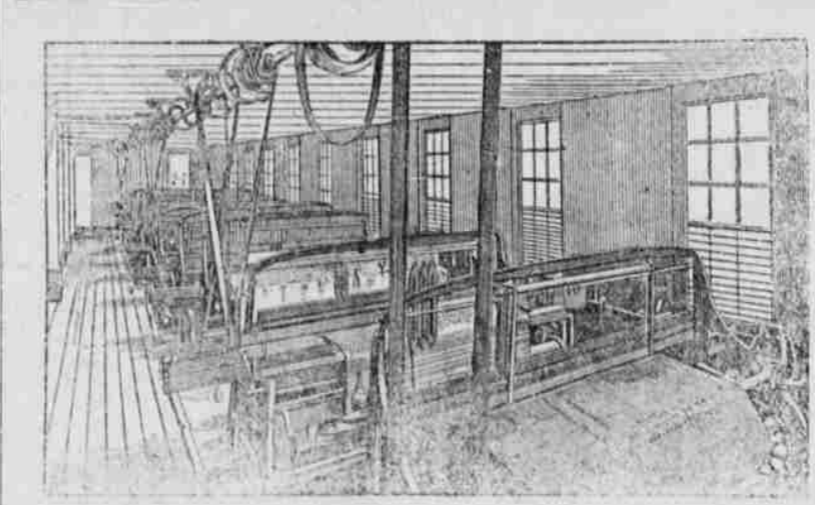
