Australia Short on Wheat.

Advisers from Sydney announce that the Australian wheat crop has fallen short of the estimated product for the season, and that stocks are being firmly held, owing to the probability of the imposition of a protective tariff by the Colonial government at Melbourne, and receipts to date are over 50,000 bags short.

He served in the Oregon legislature many years ago, and served in the same capacity in Washington Territory.

REPORTED APPOINTMENT.—The report comes from Portland by a two-path dispatch that the appointment has been made though not handed in to the senate yet, to fill the position of United States marshal for Oregon, and the lucky man is A. N. Hamilton, present sheriff of Union county.

ARBOR DAY.—A law was passed by the last legislature setting apart the second Friday in April as Arbor Day. It is made the duty of teachers to give the afternoon to the planting of trees by the pupils with such ceremonies as shall serve to encourage the planting of trees.

A syndicate of Albany and Corvallis men has purchased the entire town plat of West Yaguna, situated opposite the docks at Yaguna City. The price paid was \$15,000. It embraces 1000 lots and an undivided half interest in seventy-five acres now owned jointly by the syndicate and the Oregon development company.

GRAND RECORDER RESIGNED.—J. F. Brown, of Portland, who has held the position of Grand Recorder in the Ancient Order of United Workmen of Oregon, has been compelled to resign on account of ill health. His place will be filled by appointment of the Grand Master, who is E. L. Smith, speaker of the house last session.

The "beneficent doctrine of protection" scores another victory. The latest consular report shows that the Fiji Islanders have put a tariff of one penny per pound on soap and twelve and one-half per cent on clothing, drapery and hardware.

James B. Stevens, one of Oregon's typical pioneers, died March 22nd at his home in East Portland. He came to the state in 1844, and laid out East Portland in 1850. He leaves a large amount of property.

A sheriff's posse killed a Clackamas county horse thief and murderer this week; name unknown.

The Hessian fly is destroying the wheat crop in central Illinois. In some places whole fields have been destroyed.

Mail is now carried between New York and San Francisco in 113 hours—four days and seventeen hours.
