proclamation Inasmuch as the contennial anniversary of the inauguration of George Washington as first president of the United States will occur on the 39th day of April, Anno Domino, 1889, which day has been set apart by an act of con-gress as a general holiday for the people of the whole counter.

Now, therefore, I, Sylvester Pennoyer, governor of Oregon, by sirine of the authority conferred upon me by the constitution of the state, do hereby declare the aforesaid Tuesday, April 30th, 1889, to be a legal holiday, and I do request that it shall be so observed by the good people of this commonwealth. And imamuch as the impressive act of inauguration, which occurred at noon, was preceded at 9 o'clock in the morning by praver in all the churches of the city for God's blessing upon the government, would further request, in obedience to such a worthy example, that prayers shall be held at nine o'clock in the morning of such holiday in all our churches to the end that the blessings of God may be youchsafed to our government for all times. 


