Foreman of the Grand Jury. Dragged to Death.

As one of the residents of Creswell was walking along the railroad track just below that place on Saturday morning last he was astonished and horrified to find a dead man across the track. Investigation showed that a tramp had fallen asleep while riding on a brake beam of the second section of the California express that passed north that morning, and being thrown off the brake beam, was dragged to death. A mulatto companion that was taking the same passage saw him fall but could not leave the train until it stopped at Eugene, when he went back. He identified the deceased as a tramp with whom he had been traveling and said he was about 22 years of age and was the son of resp-ctable and well-to-do parents at Victoria, B.
