### The Reign of "Prosperity."

The anthracite coal trade is stagnant and efforts are being made to cut down production still more. The output thus far this year has been 4,302,319 tons, against, against 4,753,628 last year; but 20,000 miners of the Reading system, and from 30,000 to 40,000 in all, are said to be idle for the past two weeks, with much suffering, while the accumulation of coal at Port Richmond is represented as greater than at any other time for thirty years.—R. G. Dun's Weekly Report.

Latest reports show that several thousand more miners have been laid off, and that those who are working are getting only \$10 to \$15 per month. At Fall River, Massachusetts, 18,000 weavers and spinners are out on a strike for higher wages. They claim they get lower wages and work more hours than the cotton mill employees of England, a statement which is corroborated by the report of Jas. G. Blaine, Secretary of State, on "The Cotton Trade of the World," issued in 1881, just after an election, when the dopes had voted. The strike will prove ineffectual, and will only benefit the mill owners by increasing the price of cotton goods.

Since Harrison's election iron mills have been falling thick and fast. The Reading Iron Co., the largest in America, has gone to the wall, the manager saying that the present tariff is the cause.

John McAllister, the 13-year-old lad who is said to be dying with consumption in the penitentiary at Salem, is the youngest convict ever in that institution. He was sentenced for life from Jackson county for murdering his father, and it is thought that he will not take many years for him to serve out his sentence.

In the famous Jones county, Iowa, call case, which has been in court since 1874, a decision has been handed down against defendants for \$1,600 and costs, which amount to \$3,500. Appeal was taken and the four calves promise to cost \$20,000 before the case is ended.

### Clydesdale Stock.

EUGENE, April 19, 1889.

A party advertising in the Grand says he believes his Clydesdale horses to be the only pure bred in Eugene, his authority being the American Clydesdale Stud Book. He thinks he knows this because his are registered and mine are not; this does not make his any purer bred than mine, for the reason that the parent stock of my horses was brought from Scotland in 1871, 7 yrs. before the registration of Clyde stock began. I claim that the two Clydesdales, Brutus and Rector, are as pure bred as any in Oregon. The sire of Brutus was bought in Scotland by S. G. Reed of Portland in 1871, was bred by Mr. Bell of Woodhouse, and sold as a pure bred Clydesdale. He also bought Kittie Fisher a mare that was winner of four first premiums in Scotland with other fall blood mares at the same time and he bred from them ever since. Old Emperor, the first full blood Clyde brought to Oregon, and the equal of any ever brought here was not registered. Glenzig, another pure bred, bought by Major Bruce of Benton at the Centennial, and many others were not registered because it was before the day of registering. I will stand by the merits of Brutus as a pure bred by his breeding that he will breed as uniform colts as any Clydesdale horse in Oregon. Mr. Ladd says he will show five mares of his get, against any five in the state. His son, King Frog, was awarded the first premium at the Portland fall stock show over all draft horses and five of them were just imported from the States. I will exhibit five of his sucking colts, with five of yours, and give you the privilege to choose them from your three Clydes this spring, and next if you wish, and leave it to the public to judge which shows the purest breed. Or I am willing to compete against four year old Nelson with three year old Rector at the next state fair, thus giving you one year's advantage in age. Rector beat all at the state fair in the two year old class last fall.

### Lived Out His Life Quickly.

Henry Vrooman recently died at Oakland, California; dropped dead in fact. Brought, at only eight years of age, from Michigan across the continent, he landed on a farm in Yamhill Co., Oregon, where he worked in the summer and in the winter went to school; a boy in a wayside inn at ten; teamster at thirteen; cattle-driver at fourteen; milk seller at fifteen; miner at sixteen; blacksmith from seventeen to twenty-two; graduate of a business college at twenty-three; blacksmith again and student from twenty-four to twenty-seven; civil engineer at twenty-eight; fire engineer at twenty-nine; attorney for important corporations at thirty; deputy city attorney at thirty-two; district attorney at thirty-three, resigning at thirty-five; attorney for important corporations at thirty-seven; state senator in California at thirty-eight, re-elected at forty-two, the recognized leader of his party, making a United States senator, receiving the complimentary vote of his party at forty-three and dead at forty-five.

Salem Journal, 17th inst: The Champion left for Harriaburg this morning, and she will continue to make trips as long as the river is navigable at that point. There is now stored at or near Harriaburg 90,000 bushels of wheat, which is impossible to be shipped otherwise than by the river. There is also 40,000 bushels of oats at the same place. The owners of the wheat will lose considerable on the speculation, as they bought it last fall at seventy-seven cents, which price will hardly be reached again soon.

### Laying and Hatching.

All other game birds in Oregon put together have not attracted the attention of the press and people during the past two years, like the Mongolian pheasant. It is about the only bird protected by law twelve months during the year, and perhaps the only law violated every day in the calendar. True, these birds multiply very rapidly, despite the fact that thousands have been killed in Benton county alone the past year, but we call the attention of sportsmen to this point and appeal to their own judgment and common sense as to their enforcing the law at this season. These birds are at present laying their eggs and hatching their young, and perhaps one shot would spoil a good day's sport in the future. Don't do it. Give them a chance to raise their young brood and then if you are determined to violate the law you will at least have the satisfaction of knowing you used some decency about it. But some will say we only shoot roosters. That is no excuse. If you are under the delusion that the male birds are only for ornament, you ought not to be allowed to handle a gun for lack of common sense.—Corvallis Times.

### William S. Ladd.

A correspondent of the East Oregonian has the following interesting description of Mr. W. S. Ladd:

Speaking of Ladd, reminds me of passing that gentleman's residence the other evening just as the old man was entering. His carriage halted in the rear of his residence. A body servant, who sits beside the driver, alighted, assisted his charge to the ground and placed a pair of crutches under his arms. Slowly the old cripple dragged himself around to the front steps of his mansion. Every move seemed to cause him pain. His face gave unmistakable signs of suffering. When he finally reached the foot of the steps leading to the front doors, the servant brought him a wooden frame resembling a contrivance sometimes used to teach babies to walk. This was put over his head and the ascent was made by placing the frame on the steps and crawling up while his body was supported by the arms, the frame being raised as each step was reached. When at the top his crutches were again handed to him, the great double doors swung upon their hinges, and the old millionaire disappeared. I stood there in front of that beautiful place and commenced to think and say to myself: "That man is worth millions of money and I am a poor son-of-a-gun. There's my faithful, hard-working little wife toasting herself over the kitchen stove preparing our frugal meal; there are three chubby little children with her, and we are all poor. For their sakes, how I would like to be rich. How I would dress them; how I would feed them; how happy I would make them!" Then I thought in another direction and I say to myself: "Well, Mr. Ladd, you may have your great houses, and servants and carriages; you may have your notes and mortgages and stocks and bonds; you may have your tons of gold and silver.
